STATE NEWS.

Ashville Citizen: The peach bloom that we have seen looks sorrowful enough. The petals look as if they had been boiled. But the cold snap came in very dry weather, and a portion of the fruit crop may escape if nothing worse follows.

Charlotte Chronicle: Charlotte now boasts of another enterprise in the shape of the incandescent electric light. The system was introduced yesterday by the Houston-Thompson Company, and is operated on the same circuit used by the arc electric light.

Goldsboro Messenger: The well known firm of J. C. Brewster & Co., of Raleigh, has found it necessary to make an assignment. Assets \$30,000; liabilities about \$20,000. The poor house of Wilson county, situated about one mile from Wilson, was destroyed by fire Friday evening about 4 o'clock. Insured in German American Insurance Company of New York for \$1,500. Deputy Sheriff D. W. Rivenbark and J. I. Collins, of Pender county, on Thursday conveyed three recruits to Raleigh for the penitentiary, viz: James Wasten, W. H. Hansley and Chas. Harsley—5 years each. We were pleased to receive a visit from Elder J. R. Parker, of the Mount Olive section, on Friday. Mr. Parker is now 82 years old, but we are glad to hear is in the enjoyment of good health, and able and vigorous enough to preach occasionally, having served the Primitive Baptist church for over 30 years. Of 13 children Mr. Parker has now eight living, two died, and two sons were killed in the war.

Charlotte Chronicle: The farmers report that the recent freezing weather has greatly injured the prospects for a peach crop. Nearly all the peaches are killed. They also report that chicken cholera is carrying off the chickens at a lively rate. Jas G. Blaine passed through this city last Friday for Aiken, S. C. He was accompanied by his family. Mr. Blaine took dinner at Gresham's eating house, and his family were seated at the table with him. The old Stewart mansion, located on the banks of the Catawba river, at the point where Sugar creek flows into that stream, was totally destroyed by fire last Thursday evening about dark. The building was owned by Dr. J. B. Mack, of Columbia, and was a fine old structure. Several out houses were destroyed in the fire. The residence was occupied by Mr. W. T. Petters, a tenant, who lost all his household and kitchen furniture. The fire is believed to have been incendiary. Mr. Edward R. Stitt, son of Capt. W. E. Stitt, of Charlotte, has just graduated from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy with high honors. He graduated in a class of 300 and won the March medal. This is a great distinction and our young friend is to be congratulated upon the honor which he has won. Out of the 300 in the class, only nine passed the full mark, and Mr. Stitt stood at the head of the nine successful students.

Charlotte Observer: Mr. J. L. Whittsett, who has been in charge of the shops and yard of the Air Line Railroad in this city for a period of nine years, has tendered his resignation, to take effect on the 1st of April. An interesting religious revival is in progress at the Second Methodist Episcopal Church. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Swindell, has been assisted by Rev. Mr. Swindell. Strong interest has been manifested since the beginning of the meeting a week ago, and quite a number have professed conversion. Mr. Stephen Shuman, of Salisbury, was the unfortunate victim of a very painful accident day before yesterday, and one which cost him the loss of his fingers on his right hand. While engaged in work as a universal wood worker at Mr. Meroney's machine shop, in that place, his hand was accidentally caught in the machinery, and the result was as given above. Yesterday, Monroe township, in Union county, voted on the question of subscribing the sum of \$20,000 to the capital stock of the Georgia, Carolina & Northwestern Railroad. To carry the proposition it was necessary for a majority of the qualified voters of the township to vote for it. A hard fight was made by the opposition but the measure was carried by a majority of 68 votes. It is asserted that within a radius of two miles, including a portion of Paw Creek and Long Creek townships, this county, there are one hundred cases of measles. The epidemic has invaded almost every family and in many instances several cases are found in a single household. The scourge is almost universal, and nothing like it has ever been known before.

Admiral Huey, the ten-year old son of Mr. John Huey, who lives a few miles below Rock Hill, received a slight stroke of paralysis Wednesday of last week. His face was badly affected, and for a short time it was thought that the stroke would prove serious, but a physician was summoned who rendered medical aid, and at last account, the boy, although not fully recovered, was beyond danger of any serious results.

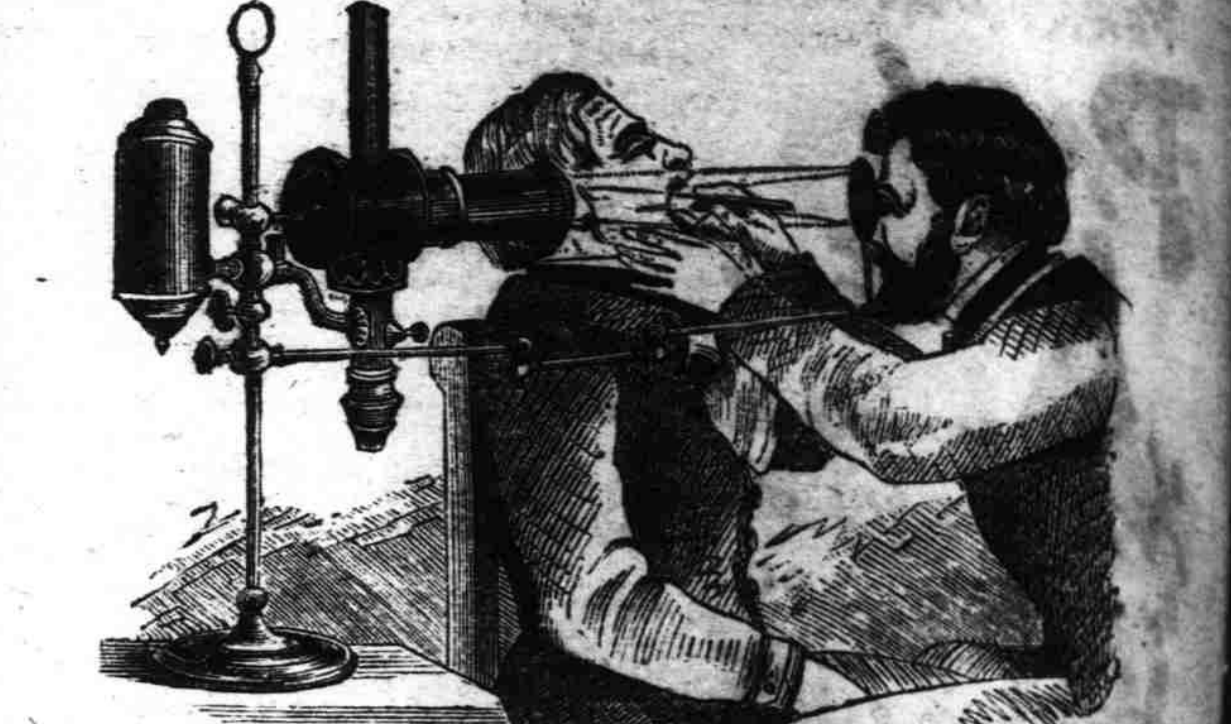
