The Flowering Moss.

We publish on the third page of this THE UNDERSIGNED HAVING PURCHASsaue a communication from a gentles man in this city, a distinguished botanist, relative to the beautiful flowering moss so abundant in this section in the early Spring. It is stated that the moss grows all of the way along the coast from New Jersey to Florida. So it does, but it is not by any means the same moss as hereabouts. It is not the same species. We gathered some recently in Florida but both the plant and the bloom were unlike ours. The latter was perfectly white, it grew on sandy soil and had scarcely any roots what ever and the whole thing withered and drooped and was worthless fifteen minutes after it was plucked. Ours, on the contrary, will live for days and the flowers keep their beautiful appearance to the last. Placed in water it will keep for a week or more.
