Board of Aldermen.

A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held to-day at 12 o'clock. A full Board was present. The first business presented was the election of a Mayor, when Alderman Fishplate placed in nomination.

Mavor Fowler, then took the oath as Mayor for the city of Wilmington for the ensuing term.

The opening of bids was then proceeded with that for printing was awarded to Mr. S. G. Hall.

Bid for feeding mules and repairing carts was referred to Committee on Streets and Wharves.

Bids for lighting the city was referred to Committee on Lights.

Bid for lumber was referred to Committee on Streets and Wharves.

Bid for feeding prisoners referred to Committee on Public Buildings.

The Committee on Fire Department was instructed to purchase a new engine for the Cape Fear Engine Company.

A petition from property holders and merchants on Nutt street to allow the W. & W. R. R. to run a track on said street was referred to a special committee, composed of Aldermen Hall, Fishplate and Rice.

A petition from the street hands for an increase of wages was received and on motion of Alderman Fishplate it was recommended to pay them \$1.25 per day.

A petition from Mrs. Cummings to build a wooden house on Nun street was granted.

Alderman Hall moved that a special committee of three be appointed in regard to the bridge over the railroad on Fourth street, and confer with the Finance Committee and the railroad authorities.

The pretty little town of Clinton has been wedded to the outside world at last. The branch of the Wilmington & Weldon R. R. has been completed from Warsaw to the corporate limits of the town and in a few days a regular schedule will be run on the road.

We have been writing a long time that Clinton would have a railroad. We have done this sometimes when the prospects looked gloomy, and when many of our friends thought our gift of prophecy was of a very low order, not to put it more strongly. Still our faith has never wavered; our hearts has never grown faint. We can now write, and we wish to write in big letters, CLINTON HAS A RAILROAD!

This auspicious event transpired at an early hour yesterday afternoon when the Clinton branch of the W. & W. R. R. reached the corporate limits of our town.

Now let us all rejoice. We say all; for the former enemies of the road seem to be entering into the spirit of the occasion quite heartily. Let our people now buckle on their armor of energy and push ahead, determined to go forward along with the rest of the world in the great march of progress.

Wednesday, March 30th, 1887, will ever be a memorable day in the annals of our town and county. It marks a new era in their history. It was then that they were joined to the life of the busy, throbbing, moving world of work and travel.

The railroad is built. It has been done under difficulties. Its progress has been slow. It encountered many obstacles and it has given rise to some feelings of bitterness and strife. Let these be buried and forgotten. Let all our people join hands and with one voice shout the good news: The railroad has come and we will all enjoy its benefits together!
