WASHINGTON, March 31.—There are now 2340 presidential post-offices in the United States. Since March 4th, 1885, changes from old to new postmasters have been made in 2140 of these offices, leaving 200 of the postmasters who were in office March 4th, 1885, still in office.

A prominent citizen of Philadelphia is in receipt of a letter from the German consul at Bombay, India, saying that Prince Leopold of Prussia, who is making a tour of the world, accompanied by Count Kanitz and Baron Von Niekisch, will, after visiting China and Japan, set sail for this country. New Postage Stamps.

The Post Office Department will, within the next four months, issue four new envelope stamps, and one adhesive stamp. These stamps will be of the denominations of one cent, two cents, four cents and five cents. The one cent envelope and one cent adhesive stamp will contain the head of Benjamin Franklin, made by Caracci, an Italian sculptor, who came to this country at the solicitation of President Jefferson. The two cent envelope stamp will bear the head of Washington, side face, after Houdon's statue of Washington, Richmond, Va. The four cent envelope stamp will bear the head of Andrew Jackson, side face, with surroundings somewhat different from that on present stamps. The five cent envelope stamp will bear the head of General Grant, side face, after a likeness which has been approved by his family. The head of Garfield will still be retained on the five cent adhesive stamp. The colors of the new envelopes and adhesive stamps have not yet been decided upon.

Holy Week.

To-morrow is known in the Church Calendar as Palm Sunday; the last in Lent. The closing scenes of the sad season are at hand and these will be typified in Palm Sunday, when Christ made His triumphant entry into Jerusalem, while the people cut off palm branches and strewed them in his way, crying: "Hosanna; Blessed is the King of Israel that cometh in the name of the Lord;" and by the measure of each day of the week—Monday, when He returned into Jerusalem and cast out the money changers in the Temple; Tuesday, when He spoke a number of wise parables and foretold the destruction of the Temple and of Jerusalem; Wednesday, when He foretold His betrayal and who it was that should betray Him, closing with the institution of the Lord's Supper and the washing of the disciples' feet and also foretold Peter's denial of Him; Thursday night, when He was arrested and bound and carried to the palace of the High Priest; Friday, the day which commemorates the Crucifixion and all of its sad and solemn accessories and Saturday, the interval between His death and His resurrection.

A colored boy by the name of Jefferson Scott, nearly grown, died very suddenly this morning at Front street Depot. He had been sick here for some time and was being removed to his home at Rocky Point, but died at the train. A jury of inquest was empaneled and a verdict rendered to the effect that he died a natural death.

The Cape Fear Steamer.

The Board of Aldermen well, we think, at their meeting yesterday, in ordering the purchase of a new steamer for the Cape Fear Steam Fire Engine Company and we hope that the Board of Audit and Finance will concur. Three good engines are none too many for a city of the size of Wilmington and those we have have paid for themselves many times over. It is a great deal cheaper to pay for fire steamers than it is to rebuild burned property. The Cape Fear Steam Fire Engine Company is composed of splendid material, always to the front when a fire is raging and as they are always ready and willing to work it is as little as the city can do to give them the materials to work with.

His Honor, the Mayor.

There is a feeling of rest and content to-day over the fact that the deadlock in the Board of Aldermen has been broken and that there is now a legal head of affairs. The feeling during Mr. King's short incumbency of the office was one of insecurity, because of grave doubts as to the power of the Board to make a *pro tem* appointment under the circumstances, and we are glad that these fears no longer exist. We think that Mr. Fowler will make an excellent official. There is no reason why he should not. He has in him all of the qualifications necessary. He has done faithful work for the party in times past and has asked no reward—He did not ask for any now. It may be said that he did not seek the office but that the office sought him. He was not originally spoken of in connection with the position and hence the honor, when it did come, was all the more welcome. Mayor Fowler's induction into office was pleasantly celebrated at his residence last night where a number of his friends called to extend him their congratulations. To day he is regularly in harness.
