In this laboratory every criminal, when taken into custody, is subjected to a thorough anthropometrical examination. He is stripped of all clothing, and the form and dimensions of his head, face, fingers, feet, body, &c., are accurately noted down, and his face is photographed.

The Paris correspondent of the London Times has described a newly invented telephone, which seems calculated to relegate into obscurity the Bell, the Pan-Electric, and the other devices of American production. This device is as simple as a push button, and quite as inexpensive. New Hanover Superior Court, Judge Connor presiding, will convene at the Court House in this city on Monday week, the 18th inst.

The Board of County Commissioners did not take any action yesterday in regard to the Onslow R. R. election. They are awaiting a decision of the Supreme Court in a similar case.

Personal.
Mr. H. B. Hardy, representing the Raleigh State Chronicle, is in the city to-day.

Mr. L. Simon left here last night on a pleasure visit to the North and West. He will be absent several weeks.

Among the consular appointments made by the President on the 30th ult., was that of Dr. Homer A. Huntington, of Amesbury, Mass., to Puerto Plata, San Domingo. Dr. H. is the son of our former townsman, Mr. William Huntington, of ante-bellum days, and the grandson of the late Thomas W. Browne, of this city.

Audit and Finance.
The Board of Audit and Finance met in regular session at the City Hall yesterday afternoon. Present: R. J. Jones, Esq., chairman, and Messrs Wm. Calder, W. I. Gore and John W. Hewett. Bills for current expenses amounting to \$5,002.76 were audited and approved, and the Board adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

City Court.
The only case for Mayor Fowler's consideration this morning was Cornelia Johnson, charged with being drunk and down. The Mayor stated that he should do all in his power to abate such nuisances and in her case imposed a fine of \$10 or 30 days in the city prison, which is the extreme penalty prescribed in such cases.

Municipal Matters.
The new Board of Aldermen held their first regular meeting last night and the new Mayor, Mr. Fowler, presided with dignity and discretion. The Board seems to have got regularly into working order and are to meet again to-night in adjourned session for the transaction of business.

Thus far, with the exception of the Mayor, there has been no change in the officials. Ballots have been had in caucus, but without result, the members being equally divided. So long as this state of affairs continues there will be no change in the officials. It takes four votes to turn out the old officers and only three votes to keep them in and hence it looks as though the ins will stay in and the outs will stay out.

Col. E. D. Hall, who has so acceptably filled the position of Mayor of this city for the past four years, has won many plaudits from our people for his conduct of affairs during his two successive terms. He has made a careful, painstaking and conscientious official, giving his entire time and attention to the duties of the position. Wilmington has never had a better Mayor. In his retirement from the office he so well adorned his many friends with him the full meed of success in what ever he may undertake.

Exports Foreign.
Nor barque *Ararat*, Axelsen, cleared to-day for Bristol, Eng., with 3,769 barrels rosin, valued at \$5,126, shipped by Messrs S. P. Shoter & Co. Ger. brig *A. M. Loringa*, Wilkin, cleared for Riga, Russia, with 2,861 barrels rosin, valued at \$2,927, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co., making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$8,053.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session last night at the City Hall. Present: Mayor Fowler and Aldermen Hall, Pearsall, Dudley, King, Fishblate, Rice, Sampson, Price and Walker.

Alderman Price rose to a question of privilege, and commenting upon the remarks made by Alderman Fishblate at the last meeting in nominating a candidate for Mayor, denied that there had been any bargain made by the Republican members of the Board, or that any understanding existed between them and any Democratic member of the Board.

Alderman Fishblate stated that he did not allude in his remarks to the Republican members of the Board, but to the party leaders.

The contract for feeding prisoners was awarded to M. F. Costin, at his bid of 7 1/2 cents per meal.

The Committee on Lights reported, recommending that the Board continue the electric system of lighting the city and that the contract be awarded to the Wilmington Electric Lighting Co., for two years; that the number of arc lights be increased from 51 to 65—one or two to be placed in Front street market house—at the price of the bid, \$10.50 for each lamp per month, and awarding to the Wilmington Gas Light Co. the lighting of the alleys and other places at their bid for the same.

Application of J. G. Burr and Walker Meares for listing taxes were referred to the Finance Committee.

The special committee on the petition for the W. & W. R. R. Co. to lay track on Nutt and Walnut streets to the river, reported adversely, and the report was adopted unanimously.

Petition of the New Hanover State Guard (colored) for the use of the City Hall was received.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the ordinance in relation to the letting of the City Hall be amended so that it will be left to the discretion of the Mayor.

Alderman Dudley moved to amend by leaving the letting to the Committee on Public Buildings. Lost. Alderman Fishblate's motion was adopted.

Petition of Howard Relief S. F. E. Co., to be reimbursed for money expended in repairs to engine house—\$367.50, with interest—came up.

Alderman Hall moved its reference to the Committee on Fire Department.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the petition be granted.

Alderman Price raised the point of order that the Board should first proceed to the election of other officers after having elected the Mayor.

The Mayor ruled that the point was not well taken, as the offices—City Clerk and Treasurer, etc.—were now all filled and the government in working order.

Alderman Fishblate withdrew his motion in reference to the petition of the Howard Relief Co.

The Mayor declared that Alderman Hall's motion to refer the petition to the Committee on Fire Department was before the Board.

Alderman Price moved as a substitute to Alderman Hall's motion, that the Board go into the election of a clerk and treasurer.

Alderman Hall raised the point that the motion of Alderman Price was not in order, as it was not germane to the matter before the Board.

The chair ruled the motion to be in order, and the ayes and noes were called on Alderman Price's substitute. It was voted down—5 to 4.

The motion of Alderman Hall to refer was then adopted.

Alderman Price moved that the Board proceed to the election of a city clerk and treasurer.

Alderman Hall called for the ayes and noes.

The call was ordered, and the motion was lost. Ayes—Aldermen Price, Sampson, Walker, Rice—4. Noes—Aldermen Hall, Pearsall, Dudley, Fishblate, King—5.

The Mayor announced the committees for the ensuing term.

The Mayor requested the committees to prepare their estimates for ensuing year.

County Commissioners.
The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session at the Court House yesterday. All the members of the Board were present; Mr. H. A. Bagg, chairman, presiding.

The monthly report of the county treasurer was submitted, showing a balance on hand to the credit of the general fund amounting to \$12,834.10, and to the credit of the educational fund, amounting to \$12,500.31. Total, \$25,334.41. Two bonds of \$500 each and five of \$100 each were surrendered and burned in the presence of the Board.

The monthly report of the Register of Deeds showed \$22.80 received from marriage licenses for the month of March.

It was ordered that Charles Daniels, sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for three years, with authority to farm out for the term of imprisonment, be farmed out to James Elder.

Ordered, that the per diem of tax listers and assessors be fixed at two dollars each.

The following were appointed tax listers and assessors:
Wilmington—J. G. Burr, tax lister; W. L. Smith, W. W. Harris, assessors.

Federal Point—J. H. Horne, tax lister; W. R. Green, Stephen Keys, assessors.

Masonboro—B. S. Montford, tax lister; Geo. Rodgers, D. W. Frank, assessors.

Harnett—E. W. Manning, tax lister; Jas. N. Macomber, G. W. Hooper, assessors.

Cape Fear—A. J. Grady, tax lister; Jos. T. Kerr, C. C. Bordeaux, assessors.

Bids were received from James G. Burr and Walker Meares for writing up the tax books and computing the taxes. Col. Burr's bid was \$500. Mr. Meares' \$465. An election was held, when Col. Burr was awarded the contract.
