EASTER SERVICES.

AT ST. THOMAS' CATHOLIC.

The usual Easter exercises were held at St. Thomas's Church both morning and evening. The floral decorations were profuse and beautiful and the music was remarkably good. There were large congregations at all the services, and all were deeply interested with the impressive ceremonies.

AT ST. JAMES'

At half-past 6 o'clock yesterday morning the children of St. James' Parish assembled in the tower of that church and, conducted by Mr. James E. It is said in Philadelphia that Keely has at length perfected his motor. C. C. Woodworth, of Albany, head of the concern that makes postal cards for the Government, says that at the factory in Castleton, Pa., they manufacture between two and three tons a day the year round. The largest order they ever filled for one city was 4,000,000 cards, or about twelve tons of paper, for New York. They use there about 6,000,000 cards a month. Chicago comes next, with about 3,000,000 cards in the same period. There are 450,000,000 postal cards manufactured annually. Two cent postage did not lessen the use of postal cards, but checked the growth of their use for some little time. The check has been overcome, and the public are using more and more postal cards every day.

The New York World has this to say in regard to Senator Vance. We publish it but we don't believe it, but we do believe that what the World says about Vance is just as correct as what Vance says about Cleveland:

"Several Congressmen have been looking up cases lately where two persons of a family hold government positions. They discovered several and have asked for their removal.
