A barber shop has been added to the other luxuries on the New York & Chesapeake express.

Chess is just now the fashionable game in New York. It follows a couple to sit off by themselves, an admits of mating.

St. Louis is already setting her pegs for the next National Democratic Convention. New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Baltimore also want it.

John W. Davis, the newly elected governor of Rhode Island, bears a striking resemblance to Senator Wade Hampton, of South Carolina, they say.

A Washington correspondent is about to marry the daughter of a millionaire Western Senator. The Baltimore American thinks it has just cause to congratulate the Senator.

During the past eight months the old world has contributed to the United States immigrants as follows: Germans, 51,612; English Scotch, 49,493; Slavians, 45,736; Irish, 24,119; Scandinavians, 21,787; Latin, 21,083; miscellaneous, 9,075.

They are building a squirrel cage for them in Osageo. The cell moves slowly round continually carrying the prisoner with it. The rotary motion is to prevent prisoners from breaking through the walls. They don't remain in one spot long enough for a hole to be made.

Perhaps the most shocking suicide until now reported was that of a Mrs. Cross, the wife of a prisoner in Nova Scotia, who ended her life by thrusting a red-hot poker down her throat. That even an insane person is able to endure the tortures attending such an act is remarkable.

Nothing better illustrates the pernicious fascination of the game of poker in this country than the discovery of a cellar in Indianapolis in which forty boys were playing and gambling away the money of their parents and employers. The man who fitted up and maintained that delightful sink-hole ought to be an object of interest for the next few weeks.

And now the heavens are soon to be mapped by photography. Admiral Monckles proposes by the co-operation of twelve observatories in twelve different countries, to obtain a map of 2,000 sheets showing the state of the heavens at the close of the nineteenth century. Twenty-five million of stars will be located by the new photographic chart.

The New York Star is of the opinion that the Inter-State Commerce law "will prove to be the most harpicious piece of legislation known in these times," and that the passage of the law was the most serious and important attempt that has ever been made to establish a paternal Government. The result of all the objections that are now being urged against the practical workings of the law will doubtless be the repeal by the next Congress of the long haul section, thinks the Star.

The official returns of so-called Irish Fenian outrages that have been submitted to the House of Commons do not justify the measures of "coercion" at present aimed at Ireland. In 1886 the outrages numbered 2,585, or, excluding threatening letters, 1,253; and in the beginning of 1881 Mr. Foster urged that the existing law was not strong enough to grapple with the system of intimidation. The coercion bill was passed, and with the removal of the restraining influence of a popular, open and constitutional movement outrages increased daily, until at the end of the year 4,439 had been reported. This number gradually lessened during succeeding years until in 1885 the figures only reached 1,417. For 1886 the returns show 1,065 outrages; but as more than one-half of the alleged outrages consist simply in the sending of threatening letters the increase in 1886 over that of 1885 must be considered as scarcely appreciable.

The remains of Peter S. Ney, who taught school in the Western part of this State during the earlier part of this century, are to be disinterred, by request of Mr. Lyman D. Apter, President of the Historical Society of Wisconsin, and the skull examined to see if it had been trophied. The object is to establish his identity with that of Marshal Ney, the Commander of the "Old Guard" at Waterloo. There are many who believe that the Marshal, Michel Ney, and the pedagogue, Peter S. Ney, were one and the same. History states that Marshal Ney was shot at Paris, December 7, 1815, but there are many who believe that the soldiers who fired the volley discharged only blank cartridges at their commander, and that Ney, who feigned death managed to escape to this country, where he took refuge in the mountains of North Carolina.
