Judge Merrick, of the Supreme Court  
of the district of Columbia, has ruled  
against the district commissioners in a  
case involving suburban real estate in-  
vestments. This is another set back  
for the corrupt Washington real estate  
ring, and an additional indication that  
the commissioners will be impeached  
by Congress if they go on as they have  
been.

Naval Academy, Ensigns C. H. Hewes  
and W. L. Capps were sent to the  
Glasgow (Scotland) University to take  
the advanced course in marine archi-  
tecture. The result has been extremely  
gratifying. The two young men stand  
respectively first and second in a very  
large class, and at the close of the term  
captured all the principal prizes.

French tragedienne, is going to become  
a nun under unusual circumstances—  
her last act previous to entering a con-  
vent will be to play at her own benefit  
at the Comedie Francaise in two love  
roles. Her father confesses he de-

is going to act to pay off her debts be-  
fore leaving the world.

The survivors of the Greely expedi-  
tion are now six in number. General  
Greely is now chief of the signal service,  
David L. Brainard is second lieutenant  
in cavalry at Fort Walla Walla; Julius  
Frederick is sick and crippled at his  
home in Indianapolis; Henry Bieder-  
beck is a messenger in the agricultural  
bureau at Washington; Maurice Con-  
nell is a private in the signal corps at  
San Francisco, and Francis Larg is a  
sergeant in the same corps.

A well-known medical man of Ber-  
mudes has discovered a new  
disease already firmly established

ville, and Capt. Pembroke Jones, of  
Virginia, were in the city on Saturday.

**City Court.**  
Charles Molloy, colored, who hails  
from the country, came into the city  
on Saturday and lodged in so much  
trouble that he was a conspicuous  
case of drunk and down. He told  
Mayor Fowler this morning, when  
called to answer to the charge, that he  
only took one "short," (which is a  
poor recommendation for Wilmington  
whisky) but His Honor thought other-  
wise and imposed a fine of \$5 or 10  
days in the city prison.

Walker Page, a colored boy, charged  
with bathing within the city limits,  
pleaded ignorance of the ordinance, and  
judgment was suspended in his case.  
Two parties for larceny were bound  
over to Criminal Court. More fully  
reported elsewhere.

**Have Returned.**  
The delegates to the Sunday School  
Conference at Southport, who did not  
return on Saturday night, came up on  
the steamer *Louise* this morning.  
They report that the Conference was  
harmonious, interesting and of impor-  
tance to the Sunday School cause, and  
they also speak in glowing terms of  
the cordial hospitality with which they  
were treated by the good people of  
Southport.

**Larceny.**  
As Officer Batson was on his beat  
near the corner of North Water and  
Mulberry streets, early yesterday morn-  
ing, he saw two men approaching with  
a large coil of rope. He arrested the  
men and took charge of the rope,  
which proved to be a nearly new manilla  
five-inch hawser, of which there were  
about 20 fathoms, and took them all to  
police headquarters. At the City Court  
this morning, when the men, who gave  
their names as Hiram Meyers and Al-  
bert Dumby respectively, were arraigned,  
Capt. Haynes, of the schooner  
*Cyrus Hall*, identified the hawser as  
belonging to his vessel and stated that  
it was stolen between Saturday night  
and Sunday morning. The defendants  
said that they found the hawser on a  
raft, but the Court was of the opinion  
that they were guilty and bound them  
over in the sum of \$100 each for their  
appearance at the next term of the  
Criminal Court; in default of which  
they were committed.

**What is the Law?**  
Sheriff Manning received a letter  
from Gov. Seales on Saturday last, the  
purport of which was that, regarding  
the warrant of execution in the case of  
John Jones, there might possibly be  
error. The law under which His  
Excellency issued the warrant was  
passed at the last session of the legisla-  
ture, while the sentence of death was  
passed upon Jones at the Fall term of  
the Criminal Court, in 1886. The case  
was taken up on appeal and the act of  
the lower Court was sustained. The  
question now arises: Is the law—passed  
after sentence had been pronounced—  
upon which the warrant of execution  
was issued, *ex post facto* in its nature?  
The Supreme Court have the matter  
under consideration and it remains for  
that body to determine whether the  
warrant of the Governor shall be exe-  
cuted or that the prisoner shall be re-  
sentenced at the next term of the  
Criminal Court. In the meantime  
prominent colored men are making  
strenuous exertions to induce the Gov-  
ernor to commute the sentence to im-  
prisonment for life.
