Ninety-five thousand employees are locked out or on strike at present in the United States, causing a loss to the idle men of not less than twice that many dollars daily. Two hundred thousand dollars a day may not seem a very large sum for that many men to lose daily, but when it is considered that in most instances there are no accumulated dollars to fall back on, the loss must be very serious. Nearly one-half, or 39,700 of these idle men are those connected with the building trades at Chicago and vicinity. There are 13,000 coke burners, 8,700 stove molders, 4,600 furnace men, 2,800 coal miners, 2,400 brewery employees and 24,000 miscellaneous workers idle. This is less, by more than one hundred thousand, than the number of men idle at the beginning of May, 1886, but the strikes of last May were only short lived, while those of the present promise to be long continued.

Mr. Gladstone is out in a paper vigorously criticizing Mr. Lecky's "History of the Eighteenth Century," in which he covertly defends the National League. In alluding to the Society of United Irishmen he says the society was instituted for the purpose of reforming Parliament by means of the union of Protestants and Catholics in a political body, without prejudice to religion. Subsequently, he says, under the force of circumstances the society aimed at the separation of Ireland from England at any cost. In the same paper Mr. Gladstone declares that Mr. Lecky in his history has inconsiderately pilloried him for having proposed to abolish the income tax in 1874, and denies point blank the allegation of the historian that the proposal was intended to bribe electors. In describing the proposal as a piece of unequalled political profligacy, he says Mr. Lecky approaches much too near the business of the Judgment Day and reveals himself as wholly incompetent to judge the motives inducing the introduction of a proposal, the making of which was simply the fulfillment of a solemn duty.

The New York correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says: "Every day adds fresh confirmation to the belief which has often been expressed in this correspondence that Governor Hill will not stand in the way of President Cleveland's nomination, provided the latter decides to accept a second term. Governor Hill is ambitious and his popularity among a large section of the New York Democracy exceeds that of the President, while his shrewd and politic course as Governor, especially during the recent session, has added greatly to his strength. But those who understand the political situation say that Governor Hill is unwilling to antagonize the President. On the contrary, he believes that they must stand or fall together. He would be willing to run for President provided Mr. Cleveland decides that it would be best for him to retire, but if Mr. Cleveland decides to run Governor Hill will probably be re-nominated for Governor and wait four years for promotion. There will be a united delegation from this State next year," said a prominent Democratic politician the other day. "The Democratic party has passed the period when it could be depended upon to make the very mistake that would secure Republican victory. There is no competition between the President and Governor Hill. In the very nature of the case there could be none. In my opinion, both will be re-nominated for their present positions and be re-elected. The only real complication is that of the Labor party, and this may disappear before this time next year."
