LOCAL NEWS.

Cardinal Gibbons arrived in New York on the Umbria on Saturday last.

There is no reason to believe that the advice will be neglected.

New Jersey is having a big boom. She is not only getting the usufruct of the Sunday persecution of New York and Philadelphia, but the marriage law, Pennsylvania is driving half of her loving couples over to Camden to be joined in holy wedlock. The Interstate Commission should take cognizance of these short hauls.

William A. Wheeler died at his home at Malone, N. Y., on Saturday morning, and will be buried to-morrow. He was born June 30, 1819, and was consequently 68 years of age. He served as Vice President of the United States with R. B. Hayes as President, offices to which neither was elected and to which neither had a rightful claim.

A delicate operation was recently performed by a Buffalo surgeon on a patient who had suffered from neuritis for eight years. The operation referred to consisted in making a small incision in the side of the face, over the seat of the pain, and removing therefrom a small plexus of nerves—one of the little telephone exchanges in the human anatomy which the skillful surgeon was able exactly to locate.

The ninth International Medical Congress will meet in Washington in September. The session is expected to last about six days. The congress meets every three years. The last meeting was held at Copenhagen, where an invitation was extended to the congress by the American Medical Association to hold the session of 1887 in Washington. The Copenhagen meeting was attended by the most distinguished medical men of Europe and America, and much valuable scientific work was accomplished by it.

Since 1803 no less than one hundred and fifteen theaters have been burned in the United States alone. None of these fires have been as disastrous to human life as some of those that have occurred in Europe. At the burning of the Ring theater in Vienna nearly nine hundred lives were lost. Lehman's theater, at St. Petersburg, was burned in 1836, and seven hundred people perished. The most disastrous theater fire ever known in this country was the burning of the Brooklyn theater a few years ago, when about three hundred people lost their lives.

Diocese of Easton.
From a private letter to a friend received yesterday from Chestertown, Md., we learn that a telegram had been received there from the Rev. John S. Lindsay, D. D., of Georgetown, D. C., declining the Episcopate of the Diocese of Easton, to which he had been elected on the 1st inst.

The Convention, on the next day, elected the Right Rev. Wm. Forbes Adams, D. D., by a large vote.

Bishop Adams was formerly Missionary Bishop of Arizona and New Mexico, and is now rector of Holy Trinity Parish, Vicksburg, Miss.

A Fine Prize.
In Mr. M. J. Dingelhof's window today we saw the gold-lined, silver goblet which was won by the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry at the target practice during the time of the recent military encampment here. The goblet stands about ten inches high, is elegant in design, and bears the legend: Presented by Wilmington Light Infantry, at a rifle contest of teams from companies of Second Regiment, in camp at Wilmington, N. C., May 20th-1887.

It is a beautiful article and we imagine that our Fayetteville soldier friends will prize it highly.

Strayed from Home.
A little child of Mr. J. D. H. Klander strayed away from the home of its parents, No. 602 South Seventh street, last Saturday afternoon and wandered to the railroad before it was found. It seems that the child had been frightened from the track by the noise of an engine and was seen by some of the members of Mr. A. Wehrhahn's family, No. 516 North Seventh Street, who took the little three-years-old wanderer in charge until it was called for. In the meantime the loss had been discovered by the child's parents and they were in great distress and anxiety until it was found. The little ones should be looked after carefully and watchfully.

More than a Blessing.
We saw to-day a gentleman from near the banks of the Northeast river, in Duplin county, who since last October has been employed in getting timber for the Carolina Oil & Cressote Works. He now has four rafts on the way here which will arrive in a day or two unless accident befalls them. These rafts are made of poles of old field spruce pines, (hitherto the most useless timber in the State) each of which is 40 feet long, for which he is to receive \$160 per hundred. It costs him five cents each for cutting the poles and the total expense of floating a raft to the city is about \$12. He has large quantities of this sort of timber, which, fortunately for him, stands convenient to the river, and what has been an eyesore has now become the most profitable property in his possession.
