Michigan stands by the Inter State law. Its Legislature has passed a bill providing for the regulation of the Interstate law, which follows substantially the Interstate law, including the long and short haul clause.

The Archaeological Institute of America has appropriated \$1,000 for investigating the ruins of Sikyon, Greece, the authority to search having been granted by the Greek Government, and has endeavored to buy for \$10,000 the site of Delhi, now occupied by a village.

The Sacramento Record-Union reports that C. H. Orr, a prominent young lawyer of South Carolina, is in Marysville, Cal., as a representative of a colony of South Carolina people, having from \$500 to \$10,000 each, and comprising many families, who have resolved to remove to California, and have commissioned Mr. Orr to locate them.

The publishers of the Century do not propose to continue the publication of the Southern Review, their recent purchase, as has been reported. The chief cause of the purchase was the securing of some six or seven important war articles dealing with the Confederate side, which the Century people were desirous of obtaining. These will be incorporated in their book of war articles shortly to be published.

Including those caused by the graduation of the first class this year, there are 151 vacancies in West Point cadetships. There have been appointed throughout the Union 143 young gentlemen, of whom 13 are from New York, as candidates for these vacancies, and 39 alternates who may have a try at the examinations if their principals fail.

There are some careless people in the world yet. Among the articles left by passengers in the trains of the New York elevated railroads last year were 1,700 umbrellas and parasols, 4,000 packages of clothing of all sorts, 8,000 pairs of shoes, 400 pocketbooks, 270 satchels, 150 pairs of gloves, 70 fans, 130 hats, 300 linen collars, 200 pairs of linen cuffs, 30 bracelets and 5 watches. Several babies were also surreptitiously disposed of in this way.

Senator Gorman, of Maryland, is an old base ball player, and in his time was a good one. He covered second base on the old Nationals in 1867. Williams, who was pitcher of the nine at that time, is now cashier of the treasury. He and Williams met on the Baltimore ball ground the other day and proposed that the old players be called together for a game this summer, each, so far as possible, resuming his old position. The Senator said they played ball very differently nowadays from the style of playing when he was a boy, but he thought he could hold his own.
