Henry George was honored by a
resolution at the Packard Institute in
New York. He said all land was God-
given, and therefore for the benefit of
all mankind, whether she inquired if
the Netherlands diked in by the Dutch
was not man-reared and rightfully
possessed by those whose labor had
brought the land out of the sea.

Every "wealthy and cultured" Cir-
culation has organized "The Amer-
ican Co-operative Dramatic Associa-
tion," for the purpose of purging the
stage of all its impurities. The pro-
posers say "it is not a financial specu-
lation," and an exchange suggests that
"the theatre-going public will see that
they are not disappointed in that re-
spect."

Mrs Langley has invested \$20,000
more in mortgages on New York real
estate, thus swelling her investment-
estate to nearly \$200,000. Edwin Booth loaned
her \$5,000 to John Surado on the same
kind of security, this being his second
venture in the last week. No wonder
there is a scramble to be one a star.

The London Court Journal says:—
"Lord Wolsey, who has recently com-
pleted thirty-five years of service in the
army, reached his fifty-fourth birthday
on Saturday. The adjutant general has
consequently another thirteen years to
serve before, under existing rules, he
has to retire. Long before the comple-
tion of that period our only general will
have been converted into a field mar-
shal and thus kept on the active list for
the remainder of his eventful life."

The German authorities have added
a new machine to their military equip-
ment. It is a combination of steam
engine, electrical machine and huge re-
frigerator. It can be run over any kind
of ground. It will be used for the pur-
pose of projecting a strong light in front
of important works, so as to guard
against surprise. Inventors of the
graphophone in the United States will
have to look to their laurels. Messrs.
Western Bros., the electricians, at
Munich, have just invented an apparat-
us which makes a perfect and perma-
nent record of sounds transmitted
through the telephone.

The Dominion of Canada is remind-
ed by the London Standard that "the
interest of Canada is to foster trade
with the United States by every means
in its power. The freer trade is on the
Canadian side the larger it will be in
spite of the insane tariff of the United
States, and the richer will the Canadian
people become and the more business
will they do with other countries." This
throws light on the theory that England
would be opposed to commercial union
between the United States and Canada.
Clear-headed Englishmen have long
seen that the interest of the mother
country requires that the colonies shall
be as prosperous as possible.

The mortality of the negroes of New
Orleans during the first ten years of
freedom was fifty-two per thousand;
during the last ten years it has been
forty-one, a decrease of barely twenty
per cent., while the mortality of the
whites has with better sanitary meth-
ods been reduced fifty per cent. Of this
the Times-Democrat says: "There is
no better field for mission work than
this. Those who have given money
for the higher education of the negro
and established colleges throughout the
South have done well; but they could
have done much better had they devoted
some of their money to the ameliora-
tion of the condition of the negroes,
and particularly to instructing them in
the laws of health and hygiene."

It is expected that Mr. Carlisle, who
is now at his home in Kentucky, will
arrive in Washington this week. A con-
ference will follow, it is said, between
the President, Mr. Carlisle and Mr.
Fairchild, touching not alone the advan-
tability of calling an extra session of
Congress but the form of tariff bill to
be presented to the next House. It was
Mr. Breckenridge, of Arkansas, who
first suggested that the way out of the
difficulty was to practically settle the
question before Congress met. This, he
thinks, can be done by preparing a
tariff bill by and with the advice of the
President and the Secretary of the
Treasury, thus giving it the prestige of
the Administration endorsement. The
idea has since been largely discussed
and generally approved, and something
is likely to come of it.

City Court.

A Dastardly Attempt.
A dastardly attempt at outrage was
made on South Front street, yesterday
forenoon, about 10 o'clock. At that
hour a young white girl in the employ
of one of our most prominent citizens,
entered an outhouse on the premises
and as she did so a colored man who
was there, and had evidently been lying
in waiting for some one, sprang for-
ward and clasped her in his arms and
placed his back to the door. The girl
was of course terrified and screamed
for help as loud as she could.

Unheeding her cries the scoundrel
made a base attempt on her person but
the girl's continued screams brought help
and as the man heard the footsteps of
those running to the rescue he released
the girl and sprang through the door,
scaled an adjoining fence and made his
escape. None of the gentlemen who
rushed to the rescue, and there were
several of them, succeeded in getting a
glimpse of the scoundrel. He was seen
only by the young girl and a child in an
adjoining yard. But those can prob-
ably identify him and we feel sure that
no means will be left untried to secure
his arrest.
