Cambridge, the seat of Harvard University, has its population of 2,623 literates out of a total population of 47,692. There is indeed a surprisingly large number of literates in Massachusetts, but as they are not allowed to hold office the old Commonwealth feels that they can do so very much better elsewhere.

The New York Star's grant monument fund is slowly growing. The Star wants to raise \$125,000 and the fund now amounts to \$1,523.81. One of the latest contributors is "A Hard Working Man" in New York, who gave one cent, in hard cash, the receipt of which is gratefully acknowledged.

The Financial Chronicle says of Justice Bond's special tax decision: "As the United States Supreme Court has always steadily upheld that provision of the United States constitution which forbids an action against a State, there is little probability that any tax will ever be laid to pay these bonds or that they will ever be recognized."

A grand jury in Gainesville, Ga., it is related, had found, some years ago, a bill of indictment against a person for carrying concealed weapons. One of the jurors arose and said: "We have found a bill against that man; now let us search the grand jury for concealed weapons." It was found that he, the juror and five other jurors had pistols in their pockets. When they recovered from the shock of this discovery the indictment was torn up and thrown away.

The London Medical Record says that there are more deaths from apoplexy in Bordeaux than in any other city in the world, and it attributes that fact to the bibulous habits of the Bordeaux. It seems that Bordeaux is given to wine-bibbing to an extent which produces an abnormal amount of disease of various kinds. It might have been supposed that Bordeaux drank pure wine, but such is not the fact. There is quite as much adulteration of wines intended for home consumption as of those sent abroad.

A war against the collection of church tithes is raging in Wales, a reduction of 10 per cent. in the amount being refused and scenes almost equal to those witnessed at Irish evictions are witnessed. At a town in North Wales two head of cattle had been seized for tithes. A large crowd of farmers and laborers speedily gathered. The cattle were sold to a bidder who had accompanied the auctioneer. A scene of great excitement then ensued. The crowd was armed with great sticks and outcries and assumed a menacing attitude as the bailiffs endeavored to take the cattle off the premises. The police became powerless in the hands of the mob, and all attempts to proceed with other sales in the town were discontinued.

Michael Davitt, the plucky Irishman, is still undaunted, notwithstanding the Government's threats of prosecution. A telegram from Dublin says: "It is reported that the Government intend to prosecute Michael Davitt and Mr. Joseph Richard Cox, (nationalist) member of Parliament for East

Clare, for their conduct in inciting the Bolyke tenants to resist eviction. There were only two evictions at Bolyke to-day. No resistance was offered. There are now only four tenants to be evicted. Michael Davitt, in a speech to-day, thanked the people for their admirable discipline, good temper and pluck. The campaign was over, he said, and victory rested with them.

The news as to the condition of the Crown Prince of Germany is anything but cheering. According to the New York Herald's advice his affliction is undoubtedly cancer of the throat. The Herald special says: "The attention of every thinking man in Europe to-day is focused upon the larynx of the Crown Prince of Germany. It is the imperial larynx be afflicted with cancer death is only a question of a brief time.

The shock caused by the death of the heir-apparent would probably kill the aged Kaiser also." In that case the chances are that within a few months there would be a European war. Prince William, the eldest son of the Crown Prince, is a fiery, dashing young hussar, who, besides the violent passions of Hohenzollern youth, has in him the making of a second Frederick the Great. He is a thorough soldier, has his spurs set to win, is an exponent of the views of the German military party, and is firmly convinced of the wisdom, from a strictly military point of view, of attacking France as soon as she is suddenly as possible.

Thus the immediate future of Europe depends on the imperial larynx. The North Carolina fraudulent special tax bonds were bought up by their present holders, Morton, Bliss & Co., and some others, for a few cents on the dollar. Their face value is about \$10,000,000 with accumulated interest to the same amount. Mr. Edward L. Andrews, counsel for the bondholders, says:

"As the interest has been allowed to accumulate, I should advise that the bondholders present the State with the \$10,000,000 of accumulated interest, and in addition reduce the rate for the future from 6 to 4 per cent., which would make an aggregate reduction of the State's liability by \$13,000,000. I believe that this is the most favorable settlement which the State can get, and I consider it liberal. Four hundred thousand dollars per annum could be easily collected from special interests without being at all burdensome."

Mr. Andrews is very kind and very accommodating, but North Carolinians will have none of his advice. Bond is not the Supreme Court of the United States, and his decision is nothing until confirmed by his superiors. We do not believe that the higher court will confirm his decision and if it should we do not believe in paying these bonds in any other way than at the point of the bayonet. Let us see whether North Carolina is a sovereign State or merely a provincial dependent of the Federal Union.

B. Boeh and J. P. Teller, representing the Sibley Manufacturing Company, of Seneca Falls, N. Y. The test was in every way satisfactory, showing that there had been neither wear nor tear to the engine to need attention.

Amateur Theatricals.

At a meeting of the Cornet Concert Club, held last night, steps were taken looking to the presentation of Balzer's ever popular romantic drama of the "Lady of Lyons" at an early date. The cast of characters has not yet been fully made up, but that matter will be arranged in a day or two, and the ladies and gentlemen selected for the different characters will then begin rehearsing at once under the direction and instruction of Mr. L. W. Woodworth, late of the Cora Van Tassel Company, who has had experience in preparing and conducting amateur theatricals. It is intended to present the drama on or about the 28th inst, and as that time is not far off, hard and constant practice will be absolutely necessary.

The Railway Bridges.

Messrs. H. A. Bagg and M. C. Guthrie, Chairmen respectively of the Boards of Commissioners of New Hanover and Brunswick counties, met at the Court House at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon as a Board of Appraisers—and Assessors for the Wilmington Railway Bridge Company. Mr. H. A. Bagg, of New Hanover county, was chairman of the meeting, and Mr. W. W. Shaw was elected secretary. The property of the Bridge Company, which consists of two bridges across the Cape Fear river and two and five-tenths miles of track—67 yards, lying in Brunswick and 4,600 yards in New Hanover—was then assessed by the Board at a total valuation of \$60,000, of which New Hanover's proportion is \$59,139, and Brunswick's proportion is \$861.

The New Orton.

The enlargement and improvement of the accommodations at the Orton House, ariel intention of which we made on the 14th inst., have now assumed a definite shape. The plans and specifications, which were prepared by Mr. J. A. Wood, the celebrated hotel architect of New York, have been received and parties are now engaged in making the necessary estimates. It is intended that when the whole work is completed the building will extend North to Mrs. Lumsden's property. The present Orton House will constitute the Southern wing, with the main building, four stories high, extending as far North as the Walker property, to which will be added another wing of the same dimensions as the present house, although it is possible the latter wing may not be built immediately. There will be a basement under the entire building, in which there will be the lunch room, lavatory trunk room, porter's room, laundry, barber shop, billiard room, bar, servant's dining room, closets, store room and engine and boiler rooms. The first floor will contain the office, private office, reading room, dining room, reception room, a large rotunda, spacious halls, officers' dining room, kitchen, carving room &c. The second, third and fourth floors will be conveniently arranged for the accommodation of guests and supplied with passenger and freight elevators. The front elevation is elegant and ornate in design, and when the building is completed it will be one of the most imposing and attractive structures in the South.
