The Opera House is bound to be crowded to its utmost capacity to-night. The box sheet has been nearly all taken, and the appearances now indicate that there will hardly be standing room.

The Wilmington Light Infantry went to Carolina Beach this afternoon, where they will indulge in target practice for prizes, which have already been described. The Company will return in season to attend the concert to-night.

Remember that this weather is the very kind upon which sickness fevers and diarrheas. Heat, moisture and vegetable decomposition fill the atmosphere with malarial poisons, and too much caution, especially as regards the little ones, cannot be exercised.

Watermelons are beginning to come in quite freely, but they are all brought from the South. They look nice and tempting but the price is too steep for our treasury balance, and we will wait until they begin to come in from the South.

Something like two inches and three quarters of rain has fallen here during the last 36 hours. It is enough to last until the middle of July. If there is much more of it the crops, which are now so promising, will be sure to suffer.

The water in the Cape Fear has gotten quite low and steamboatmen find some difficulty in crossing the shoals. It is hoped that the rains of the last 24 hours have extended well into the country so that the streams may be swollen to comfortable boating water.

We have heard thus far of no arrangements being in progress towards celebrating the glorious Fourth of July in the city. The reratta at Wrightsville will be the attraction for nearly all of our citizens who can possibly get away, but there should be some sort of sport for those who are obliged to stay at home.

The Dogs.

Up to 10 o'clock this morning 730 badges had been bought for dogs and 90 of the canines had been killed by the police. Aside from these latter a good many have been found dead in the streets where they had been thrown after having been killed by their owners.

The Rain.

The rainfall between the hours of 10 p. m. yesterday and 7 a. m. to-day amounted to 1.75 inches. The principal portion of this volume fell within a short space of time when it fell in torrents. The rain seems to have been confined mainly to the vicinity of the coast, as there was none at Charlotte and other interior towns, while there were copious showers at Savannah, Charleston and other Atlantic ports.

City Court.

John Walker was brought before the Mayor this morning, charged with disorderly conduct, but the consideration of his case was continued.

Samuel Pardie, colored, was next called up to answer to the charge of allowing his hogs to run at large in the streets. He could not deny the charge and he was required to pay a fine of \$5, besides the regular pound fees, for the offense. The running of swine in the street has become a good deal of a nuisance, and the Mayor is determined that it shall be abated, a movement in which he will be heartily supported by all good citizens.

Fatal Accident.

A most heart-rending accident occurred at Goldsboro at about half-past 7 o'clock last night by which Miss Mattie Rosenthal, a charming young lady, lost her life. At the hour named she was riding in a carriage with Mr. Adolph Oetinger, and in crossing the railroad track, in the Northern part of the city, the horse became frightened at an approaching train and, backing, crowded the buggy against the rapidly moving cars. Miss Rosenthal jumped from the buggy, but unfortunately she was caught by the cars and terribly mutilated, although she lived in terrible agony until this morning when death came to her release.

Military Matters.

We find the following in yesterday's issue of the Raleigh News and Observer:

Section 3,289 of the Code, which appropriates \$150 per annum to the various military companies in the State, was amended by the Legislature of 1887 so as to appropriate \$300 each per annum to not more than twenty-five military companies in the State. Under this amendment twenty three companies now receive the appropriation, leaving until yesterday the appropriations for two companies unclassified for. The Governor has accepted as No. 24, under this provision, the Charlotte Light Infantry (col.); No. 25, the Mt. Holly Rifle Co.; No. 26, the Rockingham Rifles; No. 27, the Piedmont Rifles, of Mooresville; No. 28, the Dare Rifles, of Manteo. All the companies will be armed and equipped at the earliest possible moment, but none except Nos. 24 and 25 will receive the annual appropriation of \$300 each, since the law restricts such appropriation to twenty-five companies. They have been accepted in the order named, so that, in case one company fails to pass inspection or come up with the requirements of law and is disbanded, the number of each company is moved up. For instance, if company No. 10, which now receives the annual appropriation, should be disbanded, then No. 11 will become No. 10 and so on until No. 26 becomes No. 25 and will then be entitled to the annual appropriation of \$300. These numbers are only used under this provision and the companies will not be officially designated by them. There is nothing to prevent the organization of other companies until the number of the state guard shall reach 5,000 men which is the legal limit; though under the present law no company can receive the \$300 until it shall, by rotation, become as low as twenty-five on the company numeral list.

The old steam fire engine Cape Fear.

which has been worn out by faithful service in the fire department of this city, was shipped to day to the Sibley Manufacturing Company, at Seneca Falls, N. Y., it having been taken in part payment for the new engine recently purchased to supply its place.

More new residences are going up in the burnt district and it will not be long we hope, before the last vestige of the disastrous conflagration will be covered up. Hon. George Davis is about to build on his lot, on second street, near Red Cross, and the Messrs. Chadbourn have well on to completion two large frame buildings on Red Cross, between Front and Second.

It has not been long since the first floor of Wilmington Steam Fire Engine House was remodelled and made more convenient for the accommodation of the engine, hose reel and horses of the company. In consequence of this, workmen have commenced to tear out the interior of the lower floor of the building, in order to make the stalls larger. In the meantime, the engine, horses and reel will be kept at Capt. T. J. Southland's stable, on Second street.
