No liquor seller will hereafter be re-  
ceived into any Masonic Lodge in Da-  
kota, either by initiation or affiliation,  
the Grand Lodge at Huron having  
adopted a resolution to that effect.

New Yorkers now speak of Henry  
S. Ives as the coming financier of their  
city. He has just purchased a pleasure  
yacht, for which he gave the neat little  
sum of \$87,000, out of his profits of the  
last four weeks.

The United States Senate for the en-  
suing twelve months will cost \$350,000  
for salaries of members and \$33,000 for  
their mileage fees with nearly as much  
more (\$344,492.52) for Senatorial offi-  
cers, clerks, messengers, &c.

The total receipts from internal reve-  
nue for all but one month of the fiscal  
year are about a million and a half  
larger than they were during the same  
period of last year, and this in spite of  
a decrease in the receipts from the tax  
on distilled liquors of nearly \$3,000,000.  
The increase from tobacco has been  
\$1,800,000; from fermented liquors,  
\$2,000,000, and there has been about  
\$700,000 collected from the oleomargarine  
tax. These figures, on the whole, speak  
favorably for the prosperity of the country.

Answers to the circular of the St.  
Paul, Minn., Globe, inquiring as to the  
Presidential preferences of editors and  
a few prominent politicians in Minne-  
sota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Dakota and  
Montana, number 1,245. Of 562 Demo-  
cratic expressions, 549 are for Cleve-  
land, 26 for Hill and 27 scattering.  
There are 642 Republican expressions.  
Blaine has 332; Sherman, 122; Allison,  
68, and 120 are scattering. Vilas and  
Lincoln have a strong lead for Vice  
President. Vilas has 157 to 66 for Car-  
liste, the next highest, and Lincoln has  
88 to 52 for Harrison.

The postal convention which has  
been concluded between this country  
and Mexico practically extends the  
postal facilities of each country into the  
other on the same terms and with the  
same advantages that are enjoyed by its  
own citizens. The principal value of  
its provisions will lie in the oppor-  
tunity for freer and more expeditious  
commercial intercourse. This will ap-  
pear especially in the facilities for  
sending parcels of merchandise, not ex-  
ceeding ten pounds and six ounces in  
weight, subject to no charge or delon-  
ation except such as is involved in the  
simple payment of duties on such articles  
as are subject to duty. Ordinary  
correspondence is made as easy and as  
cheap and ought to be as expeditious  
and certain as between the different  
parts of either country. Of course  
much will depend on the perfection of  
the Mexican system, and that is likely  
to be improved as one result of the in-  
terchange of facilities.

"Blind" Patterson, the Elmira, N.  
Y. pension swindler, was arrested at  
Gordonsville, Va., on Tuesday and  
taken to Washington whence he will be  
taken to Elmira for trial.

Here is a pathetic incident of the un-  
holy gambling craze which struck Chi-  
cago recently:

Robert G. Lydston aged 17 years,  
shot himself dead because of the dis-  
grace he brought on himself through  
speculation in the pool rooms. He was  
employed as collector for a paper firm.  
A few days ago a slight shortage was  
discovered in the young man's account,  
and an investigation showed that he  
had collected \$200 more than he gave  
up. Yesterday, a member of the firm  
saw a warrant for his arrest.  
After a hearing in a justice court, the  
young man went to his home, accom-  
panied by a constable, ostensibly to se-  
cure bail. His parents were absent,  
and leaving the constable in the hall,  
he stepped into his room and fired the  
fatal shot. Lydston's parents, who are  
wealthy residents of the West side, are  
prostrated with grief.

Nyholm, cleared for Hamburg with 3-  
550 barrels rosin, valued at \$4,075,  
shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Dowling  
& Co., and Danish barque *Nordsoen*,  
Nygard, cleared for Fleetwood, Eng-  
land, with 2,906 barrels rosin, valued at  
\$2,966, shipped by Messrs. Paterson,  
Dowling & Co., making exports  
foreign to day to amount of \$26,041.
