R. V. M. V. Morris, the Pastor, being out of town, Rev Geo. W. Roads will preach at Shiloh Baptist Church to-morrow at 11 a. m., 3:30 p. m. and 8 p. m.

On Monday, the Fourth, the money order and registry department of the Postoffice will be closed. The general delivery will be open from 9 to 10 a. m. and the carriers will make but one delivery.

Navigation and Pilotage.
At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage, held yesterday, the 1st inst., there were present Messrs Jas. H. Chadbourn, Chairman, D. G. Worth, James Sprunt and R. E. Calder.

The following, offered by Mr Sprunt, was unanimously adopted:

In view of the retirement of Mr. James H. Chadbourn and Mr. Donald McRae, who have for many years past served as members of this Board, with a zeal and faithfulness both creditable to themselves and most acceptable to the business and shipping interests of this port, Mr. Chadbourn having acted as Chairman of this Board for nineteen consecutive years and given much of his valuable time to the constant and frequently laborious duties of his office, it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board conveys to Mr. Chadbourn an expression of its high appreciation of the public service gratuitously rendered by its late colleague and Chairman through whose careful, economical and efficient administration many important changes have been made in the pilotage and navigation of the Cape Fear river and bar, and a fund, more than \$3,000, saved towards most worthy charity, originated and promoted by him, and what they trust may be a lasting honor to his name in this community.

On motion of Mr. Sprunt it was Resolved, That the thanks of this Board be unanimously tendered to Capt. Jos. Price, Clerk and Harbor Master, for the faithful and efficient discharge of the duties pertaining to his office throughout the term of ten consecutive years upon this Board.

The following, adopted at a meeting of the Cape Fear pilots, held at South port, on the 29th ult., were read and ordered spread on the minutes:

Resolved, That we return our sincere thanks to the retiring Board of Navigation and Pilotage for the port of Wilmington, N. C. in appreciation of the just, impartial, and courteous manner in which they have treated us as a body of pilots during their administration.

Resolved, That we exceedingly regret the loss of our able Chairman, Mr. James H. Chadbourn. From our long acquaintance with him as an adviser and as Chairman of the Board of Navigation and Pilotage, we have always found him just, impartial, and a true friend to our profession.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this meeting forward a copy of these proceedings to the Chairman and members of the Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage, at Wilmington.

The reference to the sum of \$3,000, made in the foregoing, is explained by proceedings held at a previous meeting of the Board, when this preamble and resolution were adopted:

WHEREAS The present Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage during their long service have, by careful management and close economy, and by keeping their small excess of income over expenses every year at interest, accumulated about \$3,000, and

WHEREAS, They are desirous that a part of this amount, not needed for the use of this Board shall be placed where the income shall be annually used for the benefit and relief of the widow's and children of deceased Cape Fear pilots, therefore

Resolved, That the sum of \$3,000 be taken from the amount on hand and placed in the hands of three trustees, to be appointed by this Board, two from Wilmington and one from Southport, whose duty it shall be sufficient security at the best legal rate of interest obtainable, to collect the interest annually and pay over the same from time to time to such persons, being poor and needy widows and children of deceased pilots of the Cape Fear river and bar, in such sums as the municipal authorities of the town of Southport may direct. No part of this principal shall ever be used but shall remain a perpetual fund and no part of the interest shall be paid until this action of the Board is legalized by act of Legislature, to be applied for.

At a meeting of the Board succeeding the above the foregoing proceedings were ratified and Messrs. Eugene S. Martin, Norwood Giles and James W. Craig were chosen the trustees of the fund, under the above resolution.

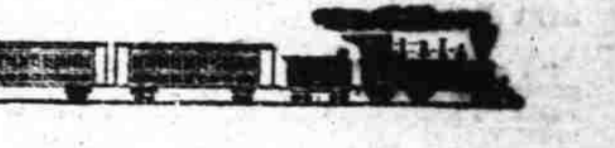

It Travels exalts attention to the fact that, notwithstanding the flourishing condition of music in Germany and Austria, only twenty six new operas and operettas were made known in these empires during the year 1886, while thirty-nine were brought forth in Italy.

The only meat which Mr. Edison the inventor, will eat is beefsteak. He likes all kinds of vegetables and for dessert always takes fruit, strawberries being favorites. It only takes him a few minutes to eat his dinner. Soups are omitted from his table. When Mr. Edison uses the telephone he fairly shrieks whoever receives his message by talking very loud. Being slightly deaf, he does not appreciate the high pitch of his own voice.

It is believed that the great Colorado desert may be reclaimed by means of Artesian wells. A well of this sort has been sunk 450 feet at Indio, a station on the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad, from which water flows at the rate of 440,000 gallons per day. This water is turning desert land into gardens, orchards and vineyards. It is probable that water can be reached at a moderate depth all over the desert. The climate is nearly tropical, and brings forward vegetation earlier than anywhere else in California.

The British Medical Journal says: Dr. Mackenzie has removed almost the whole of the remaining growth in the throat of Crown Prince Frederic William. Since the last operation the patient has contracted a cold of considerable severity, and the pharynx and larynx are both acutely congested, but the parts in the vicinity of the growth are much less affected. Local swelling has caused some difficulty in swallowing, but it is hoped that that trouble will soon disappear. Great care will be required for several weeks, and the operations on the throat of the patient will be meanwhile suspended.

During the last Presidential campaign Senator Sherman announced from the hustings that he knew of a leading Cincinnati banker and manufacturer who declared his purpose to go out of business if Cleveland was elected President. It is now said the individual alluded to was Harper, the Cincinnati bank-wrecker, who has not only gone out of business, but has taken several other people out of business with him. But it was his attempt to make a corner in wheat, and not the election of Mr. Cleveland, that did the work for him.

The English House of Lords, as the Court of last resort, has decided that professors of colleges have a copyright in their lectures delivered to under graduates attending their classes, although the Scotch Judges had ruled the other way. It appears that a student in the University of Glasgow took notes of the lectures of Prof. Caird, wrote them out, and prepared them for publication. They were not sold, however, as the professor obtained an injunction, and the matter went into the Courts. Several works of a Glasgow publisher, the materials for which were obtained in the same way, were also enjoined.
