General Corse, the Boston postmaster, has removed only nineteen out of 756 employees in about seven months and all of these for cause, he says.
Peter Barlow, who took part in the American revolution under General Washington, has died in Demerara, aged 130 years.
Dr. Charles S. Thomson, of Hartford, Conn., is the oldest living graduate in the Yale Medical school. He was graduated in 1820.
If Secretary Edicott goes out of the cabinet it is probable that General Black, the present Commissioner of Pensions, will become Secretary of War.
Frankie Kemble, the actress, has made charges against Superintendent Wilson, of the Forrest Home for actors in Philadelphia, alleging coarse, brutal and insulting treatment of the actors and actresses now inmates there.
Margaret Donnellson, better known as Aunt Peggy, the oldest inmate of the Pittsburg home for aged colored women, claims to be 130 years old, and certainly is pretty near that age. She has lived in Pittsburg since it was a frontier fort. She is active and vigorous for her age.
The new assessment roll of San Francisco real estate shows a total of \$191,594,000, giving an increase over last year of \$16,000,000. The personal property assessment is \$92,000,000. Some of the largest increased assessments have been on hotels, the raise on the Baldwin being \$200,000 over last year, and on the Palace \$180,000.

One very funny custom of the theatre here, says a correspondent writing from Mexico, is their manner of keeping their reserved seat diagram, the seats being marked upon it by small holes, in which are placed wooden pegs. When you buy a reserved seat the ticket seller removes the peg from the hole you have selected and gives it to you as your check.
Bismarck recently wrote to an aged vineyard-owner on the Rhine as follows: "I envy you your favorite occupation on the eve of your life. The vegetable kingdom repays our tender care in its behalf far more satisfactorily than politics. It was the beau ideal of my earlier years to picture myself as a gray-haired man, free from care, tending his garden with pruning knife in hand."

An instance of a princely fortune missed forms a paragraph in the history of the late Sheldon Pease. In 1843 he planned and caused to be built for the propeller Onaida, then on the stocks at Cleveland, the first horizontal tubular boiler, used in America. This same boiler, without any essential improvements, is now in use all over America and Europe. A patent placed on his invention would have yielded Mr. Pease millions of dollars in royalty.

He could not swim and had sunk twice and was sinking for the third time when a colored man jumped into the river and rescued the little fellow from a watery grave. The residence of Capt. H. Vollers, corner Second and Dock streets, was entered last night, but so far as discovered, the rogue made a water-no, s'beer haul. He got into the dining room, on the ground floor, by cutting through a shutter and a sash, and the only things missed this morning are two glasses of beer, which had been placed on ice over night. It is thought that the rascal was frightened away before he could get in any effective work.
