**City Court.**  
There was a formidable docket for the Mayor's consideration this morning, as the following will show:  
Dave Mallette, colored, disorderly conduct and an old offender, 30 days in the city prison.  
W. H. Hill, colored, larceny of juniper bolts from Messrs. Fowler & Greene. Bound over in the sum of \$100 justified bond for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court.  
Wm Myers, colored, for disorderly conduct and resisting an officer, was fined \$25. The defendant appealed and was required to give a justified bond in the sum of \$100 to prosecute the appeal.  
John Gallier, for committing a nuisance was fined \$10, from which he appealed. He was required to give a justified bond in the sum of \$50 to prosecute the appeal.

Robert Bibou, colored, for disorderly conduct and loud cursing, was required to pay a fine of \$10 or go below for 20 days.  
Wm. Campbell, colored, disorderly conduct. Case continued until to-morrow.  
Mouse Drake, the worst colored boy in the city, charged with indecent exposure, was the next case, which was continued until to-morrow.

Rev. Dr. Edward Merritt, colored, for being drunk and disorderly, was required to pay a fine of \$30 or go below for 30 days.  
Jim Bunting, Philip Wright and Miles Nixon, all colored, were asleep at fish market dock. Case continued until to-morrow.  
John Gilman, colored, for an outrageous and brutal assault and battery on his wife, was sent to the County Jail for 30 days.

It was reported at Southport yesterday that the light house on Bald Head had been struck by lightning this morning and the wood work around the light set on fire, which was, however, put out by the rain which fell at the time. It is hardly credible, however, as we know that the tower was protected by a lightning rod and the light, which is run by clock-work, was burning as usual last night.  
**Watering Troughs.**  
In view of the absolute need of convenient places at which to water horses and cattle, we would suggest that at some point near Fourth street market at the intersection of Chestnut and Seventh streets the intersection of Third and Princess streets, and the vicinity of Front street Market would be convenient locations for watering troughs, and that, as we now have public water works, the expense would be trifling.
