One of the most horrible railroad accidents known in the history of the world was that which occurred in Illinois before day yesterday morning and by means of which 118 persons were killed and nearly 500 injured. It was an excursion train bound for Niagara and consisted of six coaches, six sleepers and chair cars and three baggage cars drawn by two engines. There were nearly 1,000 passengers. The train was an hour and a half late and was running at the rate of 50 miles an hour when a burning culvert gave way beneath them. The scenes are said to have beggared description.

The REVIEW acknowledges the courtesy of an invitation from the "Constitutional Centennial Commission" to attend the celebration of the Centennial Anniversary of the Framing and Promulgation of the Constitution of the United States, at Philadelphia, on the 15th, 16th and 17th of September next.

The Status
The City of Wilmington has voted a subscription of \$100,000 to the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina R. R., in accordance with the conditions set forth in the charter of the road and under the sanction of a popular vote, as authorized by the Constitution of the State. All of the requirements of the law have been complied with. The bonds will be paid and the road will be built and the advantage it will prove to the commercial interests of the people of Wilmington will be fully demonstrated as the work progresses. There is some wild talk of "injunctions" in the atmosphere. All that we can say to this is, let those who have the money to spare employ it in this manner, if they so desire. We do not think that any injunction will hold. But it can be tried if there are any who are able and willing to thus amuse the Court and entertain themselves.

Wiping out State Lines.
The case of so much importance to the State of North Carolina, involving the constitutionality of the law taxing drummers, came up for hearing in Baltimore yesterday, before Judge Bond, upon a writ of habeas corpus issued from the office of the Circuit Court in Raleigh, upon an order made by Judge Bond upon the petition of A. W. Henderson, who was arrested in Edenton for selling without license, and held by a justice of the peace of Chowan county in a bond of \$400 Messrs Pruden & Vann of Edenton, and Francis M. Darby, of Baltimore, were counsel for the drummer, and Messrs. Battle & Mordecai and John Devereux, Jr., of Raleigh, represented the State. Judge Bond released Henderson on his own recognizance to appear before the Court in North Carolina, the last Monday in November, with the understanding that the authorities of the State shall make no more arrests for violation of the law, which requires license of non resident salesmen.

Elephantosis.

Some of our readers have heard of elephantosis and some probably have not. It is a horrible thing. The legs and feet swell to an enormous size and the skin becomes sometimes two inches thick. It is a rare disease and a total recovery is rarer. There is but little pain and the patient can walk about, sometimes only with the greatest difficulty, and never without great effort. The feet seem as if weighted down with lead. There is a case of this kind here now, the first we have ever seen in Wilmington and it may be the first that was ever known here. The patient is a colored boy, nearly grown, who came from some point South of this and is trying to make his way to Goldsboro, where he says he has friends. It is a pitiful case and draws upon the charity of many of our citizens.

More Railroad Extension

It is rumored that the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad Company will in a short time extend the road from Williamston to Jamesville and that the Jamesville & Washington Railroad Company will then build a branch from Jamesville to Plymouth and that the two will be run in connection with each other. The Wilmington & Weldon R. R. will then, it is said, extend its Nashville branch to Raleigh and possibly to Durham, thus having an outlet to deep water at the mouth of Roanoke river, and affording railroad facilities to a section of country much in need of them. When the Scotland Neck branch is built to Greenville, connecting at Bethel with the road from Raleigh to Plymouth, travel and freight from the Eastern counties tributary to these roads will have much quicker transportation.

Election Returns

The result of the election yesterday in the matter of a subscription of \$100,000 on the part of the city was carried by a substantial majority. There were registered a total of 1,676 votes, of which 1,049 were cast for the subscription and 301 against. This is a majority of 748 of the votes polled and a majority of the registered vote of 627. The measure was fairly and squarely carried. The law requires that the measure, to be successful, must have a majority of the vote registered, not of that cast, and this majority was secured. Eight hundred and thirty nine votes were necessary and 1,049 were cast. The majority for the measure, therefore, is 270 more than is actually required by law. Following is the vote in detail:
