



If it was merely a cramp of a leg or arm I do not believe that strong men would sink suddeply and almost without a struggle as we see that they do in so many A Guaranteed Policy. cases Every one who reads the papers will recall numerous instances at the seashore and at every bathing resort where these mysterious drownings take place. I never knew any one to try to account for them except by the cramp theory. The medical men ought to study the matter and see if there is not some ground for the belief that apoplexy, produced by pressure of blood on the brain. is not more likely to be the cause of death in water than drowning in consequence of cramp.-Rochester Post-Express.
