A Florida company, engaged in the
manufacture of perfumery, has built a
factory at Jacksonville, and next Spring
will start a 200-acre flower plantation at
Maito, and are putting seven acres
of Jacksonville in flowers. They have
about 100,000 flowering tube rose bulbs,
and a good many 100,000-rose gerani-
ums, in addition to which they buy all
the roses, yellow jasmies, orange blos-
soms, etc., that they can secure.

Atropine of hot weather, it is in-
structive to know that there are about 7-
800 pores in the human body, and
that each pore is a quarter of an inch
deep. The pores were hitched to-
gether in one string they would reach
a distance of twenty-eight miles. When
you remember that twenty-eight miles
of drainage is bringing its sewage to

be appreciated.

Mr. Erasmus Wiman, the Staten Is-
land House capitalist, it is said, bought
the large and famous steamship Great
Eastern. The price agreed upon is
estimated to be not far from \$100,000.
Those who are acquainted with the
fact that Mr. Wiman is to bring the
Great Eastern over to New York and
anchor her near Staten Island. The
Great Eastern is then to be turned into
a monster place of amusement and will
include within its bulwarks a theatre,
museum, variety show and restaurant.

A piece of ground in Philadelphia,
with a frontage of 16 feet on Chestnut
and 34 feet on Fourth street, was re-
cently sold for \$85,000, or \$156 per
square foot. It was necessary to com-
plete a building site in the heart of the
city, and therefore commanded this ex-
traordinary figure. This is the highest
price ever paid for real estate in Amer-
ica. The one next to it, perhaps, was
on Wall street, New York City, where
a lot sold for \$145 per square foot. The
Philadelphia price was at the rate of
\$6,800,000 per acre.

The development of coal and natural
gas in far-off localities is giving an im-
pulse to numberless little industries
hitherto dependent on distant fuel.
Natural gas is found in Dakota and
Texas, and they are after it in Color-
ado. Natural gas is plenty in Utah,
and much money is being diverted to
its utilization. A sixty-mile pipe
is to be laid from the Indiana field to
Chicago, and this enterprise has stimu-
lated manufacturers of artificial fuel to
furnish fuel gas as cheap as natural gas
for manufacturing purposes.

As to who shall be the nominee of
the party for Governor in the contest
next year is exciting a great deal of com-
ment up in the Raleigh latitudes about
now. The *News and Observer* says
that "to lead us in the undertaking we
need a man of the first order of ability,
the trust of patriotism and the purest
devotion to party. The convention in
his wisdom will doubtless choose such
a man." All of which goes without
saying. The Democratic party in North
Carolina are not in the habit of foisting
upon the people any one but "a man of
the first order of ability, the trust of
patriotism and the purest devotion to
party." There are plenty of just such
men in the State but the trouble is,
out of such good material who shall be
selected? In this dilemma the claims
of the various sections must be
heard and the Cape Fear, which has
not had the executive for many long
years, must be considered this time.

Yet is not the men so much as the
measures to be considered in the ap-
proaching contest. We want issues on
which the people can be united, and
we want, above all, something to talk
about that will draw the people out to
the polls. North Carolina is safe as
long as we can get the rank and file of
the Democratic party to take an in-
terest in public measures. The only
danger to be encountered is their
apathy. Carry them to the polls and
there is no doubt as to the result, but the
trouble is, so often, to get them there.
The newspapers may talk about the
tariff until they are hoarse but there is
one truth patent—there are compara-
tively few people in North Carolina
who care anything about the tariff.
There are few who pretend to know
anything about it and there are but a
few of those few who really do under-
stand the subject. What the people of
this State are most earnest about is the
internal revenue war tax.

The Democratic party has promised
them relief on this measure and the
relief has not yet come. It is true that
the party has never yet been in a posi-
tion to make this promise good but the
people do not understand this fact as
they should. They should be made to

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see clearly that this relief depends upon
the control by the party of both
branches of Congress and that it is in
earnest about giving it just so soon as
it is in its power to do so. They should
be made to understand this and to
know that there is no back-down on the
part of the party as to this measure.
The people of the middle and Western
parts of the State are wild on this sub-
ject and it may cause more trouble dur-
ing the next campaign than is now
contemplated.

Then, again, we should study the tac-
tics of the enemy as well as formulate
a plan of battle for ourselves. What
will they do and who will they nomi-
nate, are matters of interests to us se-
cond only in importance to our own in-
stincts and our own nominations. Is
it hardly to be expected that the Repub-
licans will come out straight into the
field and nominate a candidate of their
own to bear the brunt of the battle.
This has not been their policy of late
years. They haven't yet gobbled up
enough weak-kneed and silly-pated
Democrats to make their own calling
and election sure and they are aware of
the fact that they have not strength
enough in themselves to stand before
the Democratic cohorts. They also
know full well that there are a few
more fools left in our party and they
will undoubtedly proceed to bid for
some of them.

But we can fight them without fear of
the result if we will but continue to
stand shoulder to shoulder and keep
our powder dry. We have good men
and good issues, and if we can only
carry our men to the polls we do not
fear for the result. The stay-at-homes
represent far more danger to our cause
than all the forces the enemy can bring
to bear against us.
