### The Raleigh correspondent of the Petersburg Index-Appel has this to say of the Governor's Mansion at Raleigh, now and for some years past in process of erection:

### The new Governor's Mansion now in a half completed condition is something of an "elephant" on the hands of the taxpayers of North Carolina, and the proposition to sell it, which is being agitated by several of the papers, finds considerable endorsement. The last legislature, in view of unusual expenditures demanded for the establishment of the agricultural college and the new bureau of labor statistics, refused to make even a reasonable appropriation for finishing the building, and it is doubtful if the next will do so. The board of public buildings, composed of the governor and state officers, have authority to dispose of the property, and may do so if a reasonable price can be secured. It is rumored that the Baptist denomination will soon establish a female college here and have in contemplation the purchase of the mansion for that purpose. This, however, has not been ascertained with any degree of certainty. The building of the house has never been a popular measure with the "masses," and it will be difficult with any party in power to secure a sufficient sum for its completion, especially during the present drain upon the treasury.
