#### Important to Dentists.

Mr. S. VanAmringe, clerk of the Superior Court, has received a circular letter from the Secretary of the State Board of Denta' Examiners, calling attention to the law passed at the last session of the State Legislature which requires ail persons commencing the practice of dentistry to register their names with a diploma from some den tal college or a certificate from the State Board of Dental Examiners, with the Clerk of the Superior Court in which said persons propose to practice; and further, requiring all dentists who were lawfully in practice at the date of the passage of the law to register within six months thereafter. The law recites that failure, neglect of refusal to register for six months shall work a fortesture of the certificate, and no certificate, when once torfeited, shall be restored except upon the payment of \$25 as penalty. The law went into effect March 3rd, 1887.
