## The Daily Review.

**Lenoir Topic:** Married, on Wednesday, August 31, at the residence of B. M. Tuttle, Esq., father of the bride, near Hartland, Caldwell county, Mr. Albert Corpening to Miss Eola Tuttle, Rev. T. J. Dailey performing the ceremony. After a reception of friends the happy couple left on a wedding trip to Asheville and other parts of the West.

**Goldsboro Argus:** The daily services at St. Paul Methodist Church seem to be increasing in interest. A colored man employed on the gravel train of the W. & W. R. R. had one of his feet run over and badly injured yesterday afternoon near this city. Mr. Farrar, Superintendent of the Furniture Factory, says he has had as many as 250 applicants for situations, since he came to Goldsboro. He can employ only about 20 hands at very reasonable wages.

**News and Observer:** The protracted meeting now in progress at the Eden, ton Street M. E. Church continues to grow in interest. Large congregations attend the services every night.

Mr. Wallace Carl Riddick, one of Wake county's most brilliant young men, left for Lehigh University on yesterday, where he proposes taking a full cost graduate course. Mr. Riddick graduated from the State University in the class of 1885. He was a first honor man leading his class in every study.

The receipt of new cotton for the week ending Thursday, September 8th amounted to 466 bales. Receipts for the same week last year were 22 bales, showing the remarkable increase of 444 bales for this year. The receipts of Friday and yesterday aggregated 642 bales in addition to the above, making the total receipts of new cotton to date 1,108 bales. Engineer Jake Hicks has been honorably discharged from the service of the R. & D. R. Co., the reason being that, for want of opportunities in early life, he is unable to read the new rules and regulations of the company. He has been on the N. C. Road for more than twenty-five years, has run thousands and thousands of miles without ever having an accident. There has never been a man more faithful to duty. Of course the road will provide a new position for him or give him a pension. Arrangements have been perfected for the trip of the Governor, his staff and escort to the Centennial Celebration of the Constitution at Philadelphia, as follows: The Governor will leave the city in a private car on the evening of the 13th inst. He will be accompanied by Col. A. B. Andrews, Associate Justice A. S. Merrimon, Chairman R. H. Battle, Hon. W. R. Cox and Hon. Walter L. Steele. This party will stop over in Greensboro until the morning of the 14th. They will be joined there by members of the Governor's staff, Adjutant General Johnstone Jones, Gen. J. M. Leach, Col. F. H. Fries, Judge Advocate General G. H. Brown and Assistant Paymaster General Benehan Cameron. The Governor's escort, the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry, about fifty strong, will also join him at Greensboro and on the 14th the entire party will proceed to Philadelphia. The Governor yesterday issued commissions to officers of new white military companies and one new colored military company, all of which have been ordered armed by the Commander-in-chief. The companies and officers are as follows: **Dare Rifles:** James M. Whitson, captain; James M. Gray, first lieutenant; Wm. G. Forbes, second lieutenant; commissions to date from June 21, 1887. **Palmira Home Guards:** W. E. Spruill, Jr., R. M. Burroughs, first lieutenant; E. W. Hymon, second lieutenant; commissions to date from July 15, 1887. **Mt. Holy Riflemen:** Thos. G. Costner, captain; Robert S. Stowe, first lieutenant; Andy J. Smith, second lieutenant; commissions to rank from May 7, 1887. **Scotland Neck Mounted Riflemen:** W. H. Anthony, captain; G. S. White, first lieutenant; C. T. Currie, second lieutenant; commissions to date from July 25, 1887. **Lumberton Light Infantry:** N. A. McLean, captain; A. E. White, first lieutenant; F. J. Floyd, second lieutenant; commissions to date from June 21, 1887. Gray J. Toole was commissioned captain of the Charlotte Light Infantry, colored. Messrs. C. M. Busbee and C. B. Edwards leave this morning for Denver, Colorado, where they go to attend the sixty-third annual session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. The other representative from North Carolina is Mr. Junius Slocomb, of Goldsboro.
