The New York Evening Sun says that the reports published to the effect that General Master Workman Terence V. John J. Bealin, of District Assembly 49, says: "Mr. Powderly will never resign so long as he sees \$5,000 salary in the office. Mr. Powderly is as near Europe as he will be for some time to come. She says that her other flame, Prince Erikoff, who wanted to fight Leuville because of the cowhiding incident in Paris, has gone to Russia; that his full name is George Erikoff de Gourie; that he is a grandson of George XIII, the last Georgian king, and that he is spoken of as the Czar's favorite for the Bulgarian throne.

Brunswick Court adjourned yesterday.

About 50 excursionists arrived here yesterday on the Clinton train.

To-day's receipts of cotton are the largest of the season, thus far.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon the thermometer in this office registered 90 degrees.

The water is very low in Black River now and no attempt is made to run above Point Caswell.

There is some talk by the owners of the steamer *Enterprise* of building another and a better boat to take her place on Black River. The owners are to meet together in a few days and come to a decision.

The steam tug *Alexander Jones* hauled out in the stream this morning for the purpose of having two masts erected. She will be ready for service by the first of October, and will be commanded by Capt. John W. Harper.

Rev. S. M. King, of Kelly's Cove, Bladen county, who recently passed examination and was licensed by the Presbytery, preached an eloquent and instructive sermon at the Presbyterian Church at Point Caswell on Sunday last.

Spanish brig *Esperanza*, from this port for Ponce, P. R., put into St. Thomas on the 22d, leaking.

Mr. J. A. Lewis, of Southport, opened at that place to day a first class beer, wine and cigar saloon.

The receipts of cotton at this port to-day took up 1,723 bales, against 47 bales for the corresponding date last year.

It is now said that cotton in the Point Caswell section of Pender county will fall somewhat short this year. Grapes, too, are unusually scarce this year but the potato crop will be a large one.

Messrs. Polyvogt & Rehrer open in Brooklyn to-day with a handsome stock of new goods. They occupy the store on Fourth street recently vacated by Mr. Blumenthal, which they have had refitted for their business.

Mr. C. P. Locke, Commissioner, sold at public auction a few days since, through Messrs. S. VanAmringe & Co., auctioneers, a valuable lot of land at the intersection of Wooster and Second streets. It brought \$425 and Mr. C. Michaelis was the purchaser.

We are not much given to blowing our own trumpet. It is an art in which we are not exactly a proficient, as our friends well know. Still, there can be no harm in stating that we, too, as well as the *Star* added 14 names to our subscription list to-day. This is a contingency but it is a fact as well.

City Court.
The only case for the Mayor's consideration this morning was that of Wright Simmons, charged with disorderly conduct. The evidence being insufficient to convict, he was discharged.

Magistrate's Court.
Henry Hill, colored, was arraigned before Justice Millis this morning on the charge of assault and battery. He was found guilty and ordered to pay the cos. This he failed to do and was committed to jail.

Temperance Brotherhood.
An organization of colored men under the above name will hold a P. O. meeting to-night at 8 o'clock in the hall of the Young Men's Christian Association. Rev. D. H. Tuttle, of the Fifth Street M. E. Church, is announced as the speaker for the occasion. The Mendelssohn Quartette Club will furnish music.

A Sudden Attack.
Mr. Nelson Jenkins, who holds a position in the dry goods establishment of Messrs. Brown & Roddick, on North Front street, started to his dinner to-day about 2 o'clock, and when near the post-office he became exhausted and fell in the street. A carriage was called and Mr. Jenkins was conveyed to his home on North Fourth street. It was rumored that he was sun struck, but this is not true. He has been feeble for several days and the physician in attendance states that he has an attack of fever.

New Steamer for Black River.
Capt. D. J. Black, of the steamer *Lisbon*, is building a new steamer at Sherran's Landing, about four miles above Point Caswell. The new boat will be about 85 feet in length and 18 feet beam, and will take the place of the *Lisbon*, which will be laid up and not be run again. It is expected that she will be ready in two months, say about the middle of November or the first of December. Capt. Black will be sole owner of the new steamer, as he is of the *Lisbon*. The new boat will be of the same draft as the old one but of a larger capacity.

Death of Mrs. Williams.
Mrs. Sarah C. Williams, one of the most highly esteemed residents of this city, a lady of many virtues and a sincere, upright, christian woman, died at her residence in this city at 4 o'clock this morning, the result of a paralytic seizure some days since, aged 73 years. Mrs. Williams was the relict of the late William A. Williams, and the mother of Mr. W. A. Williams and Mrs. Louis H. Belden, of this city, and Mrs. Capt. Little, of Virginia. The funeral services will take place at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning from St. James' Church.

The Clinton Train.
The Clinton train, which leaves here at 5 o'clock in the afternoon and returns at 10 o'clock in the morning, is a great favorite with the people along the line. The distance is about 65 miles and the run is made in three hours each way, including a dozen stops, which gives a running time of more than 30 miles an hour. In some places even better time than this is made. For instance, the run from this city to Rocky Point, 14 miles, is made in 21 minutes, which is exactly 35 miles an hour. It is a pleasant train and runs during the most pleasant part of the day, at this season. Capt. G. D. Hawkes is the conductor, and Mr. Jack Bissett is the engineer.
