The Prohibitionists carried every county in Florida in which an election has been held under the new local option law.

Twenty-three women are employed in the New York custom house under the title of "inspectresses," who are employed to hunt down female smugglers. They work from 7 o'clock in the morning until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and receive a salary of about \$3 a day each.

George Ticknor Curtis continues to be the champion of Statehood for Utah. His latest point is that the proposed Utah State constitution makes polygamy a felony, puts the power to pardon such offenders in the hands of the President of the United States, and takes from the Utah people all power to amend these provisions. Therefore, Mr. Curtis argues, Congress is bound to admit Utah.

George Blair, president of the New York State Workmen's Assembly, has completed a tour of the State on private business, but he has taken pains to canvass the political situation with reference to the various labor parties. He thinks that now that the Socialist workers have been withdrawn, the George party "will not assume very large proportions" this year.

There's a fact that ought to have been told before the convention of doctors in Washington. It comes from the Signal, Duluth, Ga.: "A good many people are accustomed to use peach bark tea when sick. So we will give them something new—at least to which several good citizens have subscribed for as the truth: When tea is made from bark that is skinned off toward the tea acts as an emetic; when skinned downward its acts as a cathartic."

The business in new States will be active at the next session of Congress. Jewish Festivals.

The month of September is the harbinger of the festive season for the Israelites all over the earth. Yesterday, the 18th, at sunset, the Israelites commenced to reckon their ecclesiastical year as 5643 after the creation of the world. New Year's Day, or Rosh Hashanah, will be celebrated from Sunday, the 26th, until the following Tuesday night. This holiday is also called the Day of Remembrance, and the blowing of the ram's horn is the most significant ceremony of the day.—Modern congregations, or, as they called, reformed congregations, celebrate only one day, while the more strict Israelites will keep two days.—Wednesday, the 21st, is the fast of Gadaiah, and Saturday, the 26th, is the sixth day of penitence, and especially a day for reviving religious sentiment.—On Tuesday night, the 27th, begins the great Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) the most august day in the Jewish calendar, and then will gather every Jewish man, woman and child into the house of worship. For it is the day upon which the Israelite feels himself nearer to his God. It is a fast day, and lasts from sunset until sunset. At sunset on October 21 begins the Feast of Booth, which lasts for eight days and with palm branches, citron, the myrtle and the willow, representing strength, meekness, purity and charity, the Israelites render thanks to their Creator for all the bounties which a kind Providence has showered upon them and on the earth. October 11th is the festival of rejoicing in the law. On that day the most conservative and orthodox congregations finish the reading of the weekly lessons of the Pentateuch. On October 19th and 28th few, if any Israelites attend to their secular affairs; and most, if not all, Jewish merchants' stores are closed.

A Dastardly Murder.

A dastardly murder was committed yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, near Castle Hayne, about 9 miles North of the city. Jim Wilbert, colored, and his wife, who have been living in that neighborhood, had a quarrel when the man picked up the baby and threw it out of the window and then turned and caught his wife in his arms and deliberately cut her throat. Thinking that she was dead he left the house. The woman managed to crawl to the house of a neighbor, about one hundred yards off, and rapped for admittance. When the door was opened a pitiable sight was presented to the inmates. The woman tried to tell what had happened but could not utter a word, she could only move her lips. She staggered back about ten feet and fell to the ground and expired almost instantly. The child, an infant about twelve months old, was found by the neighbors where it had been thrown from the window. It had fortunately escaped serious injury.

As soon as possible information of the terrible tragedy was sent to this city, and measures for the arrest of the murderer here at once taken. Deputy-Sheriff Shaw immediately told off a number of subordinates and Mayor Fowler, with a squad of policemen accompanied by the man who brought in the information guarded the depots and the road leading to Castle Hayne. At points between Little Bridge and Toonors' Creek, a colored man passed them, when the messenger from Castle Hayne identified him as the murderer. Mayor Fowler thereupon ordered him to halt but he jumped out of the road and ran through the woods. The Mayor fired four shots at him, but did not stop him.

In the absence of Coroner Miller Ex-Coroner Jacobs was deputized to hold the inquest. The jury after full investigation returned the following verdict: "That Jane Wilbert, the deceased, came to her death by a razor or some other sharp instrument in the hands of Jim Wilbert."

The murderer has thus far made good his escape, but he will most likely be caught soon. Mayor Fowler received a telegraphic message this morning, at 11.30, from Meares' Bluff, stating that Jim Wilbert had just passed there. Judge Meares issued bail warrants for his arrest and placed them in the hands of Officers B. F. Turlington and H. Woebse, of the police force. They will leave this afternoon in search of him.

Fire in the Cotton.

Messrs. C. S. Love & Co., agents of the line in this city, received a dispatch this morning from Capt. R. H. Tomlinson, of the steamer *Cope Fear*, from Fayetteville to this place, announcing the fact that a fire occurred among some cotton in his cargo. The date was not given but it is likely that the accident took place yesterday, as the dispatch was dated from Clarkton, whither it had been sent for transmission, this forenoon. Capt. Tomlinson says:

Flat load of cotton caught on fire at Sugar Loaf. Had to throw the whole load, 310 bales, in the river, to save the flat. Am now at Smith's Landing, taking up cotton and putting out the fire. The loss will amount to from \$300 to \$500. Crew and passengers all safe. Neither boat or flat damaged.

The cargo is all insured, so that there is no loss to the owners of either the cotton or the steamboat line. Capt. Tomlinson must have acted with remarkable energy and dispatch in the emergency. The *Cope Fear* has not yet arrived here, but will probably get in this afternoon or to night.

Coal in Bladen.

Mr. Asa A. Brown showed us to-day a specimen of coal, taken from the lands of Mrs. Ellen Guion, in Bladen county, where it outcrops, that we think may be classed as canal coal. Exactly how much there is of it is not known but the evidences are that there is a large and valuable vein of it. Specimens of it are to be sent to parties North and more in regard to it will be known soon.
