One of the two swords of Earl Van Horn, the Confederate general, that were stolen from the family residence near Mount Vernon, Ala., in the spring of 1865, have been discovered in the possession of a man named Bort, who lives at Lennox, Iowa. Mr. Burt claims to own the weapon by right of capture however, and declines to surrender it without handsome compensation. Capt. Frank Lumsden, of Mobile, has been commissioned by the surviving relatives of Van Horn to recover the sword if possible, but they are hardly willing or able to pay many times its intrinsic value.

Of the Empress Eugenie a Paris correspondent writes: "She was lately at Amsterdam, whither she went to consult a noted Dutch physician respecting the rheumatism, from which she is a constant sufferer. An American lady who saw her there tells me she has grown very stout and infirm, and has lost every vestige of her once dazzling beauty. She is subject to attacks of insomnia during which she will sit the whole night through before the portrait of the Prince Imperial, and these attacks usually terminate in fits of weeping and acute hysteria."

The New York police have just traced the commission of a burglary to four professional criminals whose cases ought to excite the interest of the Prison Reform Association. One of them is thirty years old, and has served six terms of imprisonment, beginning at fourteen. Another has served at least one term in Sing Sing, and other terms in two other States. A third has served three terms in the prisons of South Carolina, and a fourth has been imprisoned in Maryland, Pennsylvania and Ohio. Of course, the individual instances in crime might be multiplied and even surpassed, but it is not often that the police come upon such a gang of veterans.

A Little Local History.
The brick residence on the corner of North Front and Chestnut streets, recently owned and occupied by Hon. R. R. Bridgers, which is now being torn down to make room for the new Federal building, was erected in the year 1845 by Mr. Wm. B. Meares, the father of Hon. O. P. Meares. In 1843 a brick residence stood on the same spot, and was occupied by Mr. Meares, but it was destroyed by the fire in that year, which started in the alley North of the First National Bank building and swept up to the depot. The building now being demolished was one of the most comfortable and commodious residences in the State.
