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The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 1,870 bales.

There was a dense fog in the early morning hours, but it was soon dispersed by the warm rays of the sun.

We see a good many strangers in the city to-day, many of whom were making purchases of either dry goods or clothing.

Remember the sociable to be given to-morrow night by the ladies of Fifth Street M. E. Church at 409 South Fourth street. It will be an enjoyable occasion and for a good purpose.

Swed. barque *Akerhjeltn*, Johnsen, cleared late on Saturday night for Bowling, Scotland, with 250 casks spirits turpentine, and 2,761 barrels rosin valued at \$6,707, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co.

Mr. E. H. Sneed, Manager of the Knoxville Furniture Company, having been pushed for room for some time past, has leased the entire second floor above his furniture house, corner Market and Second streets.

Mr. H. L. Fentress, the Brooklyn druggist, has removed his establishment to the corner of Fourth and Hanover streets, which he has had handsomely remodeled and improved and where he offers a full stock of goods in his line, as also a full stock of stationery for the convenience and accommodation of the children in Brooklyn.

**Shoal Water.**  
Steamboatmen report about 26 inches of water on the shoals in the Cape Fear, which is hardly depth enough for good and comfortable boating. And the trouble is that the depth is constantly growing less, and will continue to do so until the rains begin to fall in the up-country to swell the streams.

**Contract Awarded.**  
The Committee on Fire Department of the Board of Aldermen have awarded the contract for furnishing a double set of drop-harness to Messrs. Fennell & Daniel, their bid being the lowest. The two sets, complete, will cost \$125. They are intended for the Cape Fear fire steamer.

**Good Trade.**  
It is undoubtedly a fact that our merchants are doing a much larger business at this time than they did at the corresponding date last year. It appears that this is true in all departments of trade. Our stores are crowded with customers and the salesmen are kept busy in displaying the fine array of seasonable goods with which their shelves and counters are stocked and in packing the parcels that have been sold.—One large clothing-dealer stated to us to-day that his average daily cash sales at this time were more than twice as much as they were at the corresponding time in 1886.

**City Court.**  
Charles Nolan was the first case for the Mayor's consideration on Saturday night, for which he was required to pay a fine of \$20 or work 30 days on the public streets.

Chris. Cummings, a gallant sailor boy belonging on board the British steamship *Benaerc*, was drunk and disorderly at Front and Brunswick street Saturday night, for which he was required this morning to pay a fine of \$10 or work 30 days on the public streets.

This closed the docket for to-day, Chief of Police Hall having donned his official harness with an hand to look out for those who had violated the city ordinances and to take and receipt for any fines which might be mulcted from defendants who might be convicted.

In this connection it may be proper to state, for the benefit of all concerned, that Mayor Fowler is determined to break up all rowdyism and to suppress all noisy, profane or unseemly language on the public street and as a warning to others he will impose the heaviest penalties permissible by law upon those who are convicted before him of being guilty of such offences.

There was another advance in cotton in New York to-day and sellers here held for better prices, but as our local buyers are purchasing for Liverpool market, where there was no advance, there were no sales effected at the time of closing our report. The receipts for the day at all American ports are estimated at about 57,000 bales.

**Col. Hall at Sandy Run.**  
There was a handsome turnout of the citizens of Grant township at Sandy Run on Saturday last, on which occasion Col. E. D. Hall, of this city, addressed them in regard to the proposed subscription by the township to the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina R. R. There was much interest manifested and it was clear that the friends of the measure were largely in the majority.

Up to 12 o'clock on Saturday there had been 219 votes registered, out of a voting strength of 365. The election takes place to-morrow. The following resolutions was adopted at the meeting last Saturday:

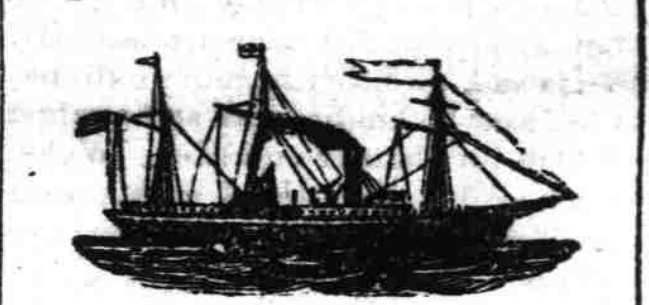
