STATE NEWS.

Wadesboro Messenger: The Rev. Chas. C. Quin was admitted to the holy order of Priesthood last Wednesday, in St. Luke's church Lincoln. The Right Rev. T. B. Lyman, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of the Diocese, officiated, the Rev. Dr. Marshall, of Raleigh, presented the candidate, and the Rev. Jos. B. Chesire, Jr., of Charlotte, preached the sermon.

Pittsboro Home: Rev. Mr. Baldwin has given up the charge of his churches in this section and will remove to Winston in a few weeks. Robbie Gilmore, aged 8 years and 8 months, walked one mile to the field, and picked out 100 pounds of cotton, two hours before sundown. We very much regret that Dr. J. M. Manning has determined to change his residence. It is probable that he will settle in the town of Durham.

Raleigh News and Observer: Mr. Howard Haywood has a very curious and interesting relic. It is a bronze medal, about two inches in diameter, which was taken from the body of a dead Federal soldier at the battle of Spotsylvania. On one side is the following inscription: "En Memoriam De Los Hechos Heridos Del Regimiento De Ingenieros Simbolizados. En Las Corbatas De La Orden Militar de S. Fernando Obtenida en Jincio Contradictorio 24 De Setiembre de 1847." On the other side there is an engraving of the head of Queen Isabella, with the inscription: "Isabella, Reina de las Espanas."
