Almost a Fire.
The fire which was the cause of the alarm from box 53 at about 10 o'clock this morning, was on board the schooner *Delhi*, Capt. Greene, which is lying at the wharf at Kidder's mill. The cause of the fire was the boiling over of a pitch kettle in the galley. The flames were speedily extinguished by the crew without doing any further damage than a badly smoked galley.

Comic Opera.

There will be a meeting to-night at 8 o'clock at the residence of Mrs. C. R. R. Meares, on Fifth street, between Market and Princess, of the musical portion of our people to make preparation for the presentation to a Wilmington audience of the Comic Opera, "The Little Tycoon," within a short time. We are glad to note this as we know that there is an abundance of talent in the city to afford musical entertainment to our people, and we hope to see it developed, with the wish that it may be properly appreciated by our citizens.

Criminal Court.

New Hanover County Criminal Court, Judge O. P. Meares presiding and Solicitor B. R. Moore appearing in behalf of the State, convened at the Court House in this city at 10 o'clock this forenoon. The following were drawn as grand jurors for the term: C. W. Bradley, foreman; N. Hutaft, J. T. Wood, A. T. Hewlett, C. L. Frost, J. Farrow, J. T. Woolvin, T. F. Bagley, W. C. Farrow, W. M. Canady, A. H. Grice, H. O. Craig.

The following cases were then heard before the Court took its noon recess:

State vs. George Jones, assault and battery. Defendant submitted. Judgment, one penny and costs.

State vs. Sam Williams, larceny. Abated in consequence of the death of the defendant.

Found Dead.

Berry Stewart, colored, was out yesterday afternoon, looking for an ox that had strayed away, and when opposite the Barnes place, out Castle street, he found the body of a dead man. He immediately notified the Coroner, and the latter had the body, which proved to be that of Peter Stanley, colored, brought to the city. Owing to the lateness of the hour an inquest was not held until this morning. The opinion of the physician, who made an examination of the matter, was that the deceased came to his death for the want of proper food and attention, and the jury rendered a verdict accordingly. The deceased was about 65 years of age, had been a sort of truck farmer, and has been frequently seen on our streets with vegetables for sale. He leaves several children, none of whom, however, were present at the inquest, and he was buried at the expense of the county.

City Court.

There was a small docket for the Mayor's consideration this morning, which was disposed of as follows:

Jordan Branch, allowing his cows to run at large. The defendant submitted and a fine of \$5 was imposed in his case.

David Armstrong, alias David Jones, a sailor, charged with disorderly conduct. He was found guilty and as the case was of an aggravated nature he was fined \$20, with the alternative of 30 days in the chain gang.

George Herbert, for disorderly conduct, was fined \$20 with the alternative of 30 days in the city prison.

D. J. Stevens, for disorderly conduct, \$10 or 20 days.

This closed the regular docket and the Mayor then said that it had been charged that unfair discrimination had been made in his office by imposing a fine upon some who had been guilty of violation of the city ordinances and allowing others to go free, and called Officer Brinkley to the stand to whom, after administering the oath, he interrogated regarding the arrest of a party whose name did not appear upon the books of the office. The officer had made such an arrest. Sergeant Orrell said that the party was discharged by order of the Chief of Police who directed that the name should not be entered upon the books. Chief of Police Hall, being duly sworn, stated the circumstances and the reason for his conduct. The Mayor then ordered a fine of \$10 to be entered against the Chief of Police for the suppression of testimony which should properly come before the Court, from which judgment the Chief of Police appealed.

Clear the Track.

In case of an alarm of fire it should be the duty of all, as far as in their lay, to keep clear of all streets in which the engines would be compelled to pass to reach the scene. We are led to make these remarks from the fact that while one of the engines was on its way to the fire this morning it was compelled to stop—although the gong had been ringing three times—to allow a light vehicle in which were two men to get out of the way. Firemen, when on duty, should be treated with every consideration and instead of being obstacles every one should try and facilitate the progress of an engine while on its way to a fire.

The gubernatorial Campaign.

The Raleigh correspondent of the *Petersburg Index-Appal* speaks at length relative to the campaign for the nomination for Governor of this State, which will soon open. He says that the sentiment of the people seems to have narrowed down to a choice between Lieut. Gov. Chas. M. Stedman and Judge Walter Clark. Hedwells at length upon the latter gentleman's claims and prospects and then says this of Maj. Stedman:

The friends and supporters of Lieutenant-Governor Stedman may be classed among the "young America" of the State. They see in their champion a representative gentleman of splendid executive ability, fine presence and of first-class versatile talent. He has presided over the deliberations of the State Senate in a manner calculated to win friends among all shades of political opinion. He is wedded to no political wing, and is not identified with any of the "issues" that float around so promiscuously in these latter days. He is a genuine, unflinching Democrat of that may be termed the true Jeffersonian type. He is modest, but firm, and so free from hypocritical pretensions that he may be said to be one of the few politicians of the day who would not "flatter Jove, even for his thunderbolt." That Lieutenant-Governor Stedman is the beauideal of the rising young Democracy of North Carolina is beyond question, and that his candidacy will be of the most formidable character is conceded by all. Another and, perhaps, a more potent reason exists, than any yet given, why Mr. Stedman should be the choice of the Democracy in the coming contest. He comes from the greatest commercial centre of North Carolina, and from a section of the state, which since the war has had but little prominent official recognition. The west and the east—the former in the person of Governor Vance, and the latter in that of Governor Jarvis, have had their representatives in the executive chair. The gallant Ransom looms up as our model senator from the northeastern section, but the grand old Cape Fear tier of counties seems to have been given the go by. Your correspondence asserts upon the authority of a careful observation (the best criterion after all) that the present outlook is that the progressive Democracy of the State will push the name of Stedman before the nominating convention to a successful consummation, and with this result equal success at the ballot box can be confidently expected.
