Floating Gardens of the Aztecs.
During all their wandering,
wherever they stopped the Aztecs
cultivated the earth and lived upon
what nature gave them. Surround-
ed by enemies, in the midst of a lake
where there were but few fish,
necessity and industry compelled
them to form floating gardens on
the bosom of the waters. They
wove together the root of aquatic
plants intertwined with twigs and
branches until they formed a founda-
tion sufficiently strong to support
a soil they drew from the bottom of
the lake, and on it they sowed their
needed maize and chilo. These
floating gardens were about a foot
above the water and of various forms,
the most effective being long and
narrow, called cintas, or ribbons. With
their natural taste for flowers, they
added the ornamental to the useful,
and these small gardens multiplying
were covered with flowers and
aromatic herbs, which were used in
the worship of their gods or sent to
decorate the palace of the emperor.
