The Senator has added to the measure, as it passed the Senate in the last Congress, a section increasing phenomethe number of regular soldiers by 2,-500. This is one-half the increase. Gen. Sheridan thinks the army ought to have, and it is added to the bill with the idea of helping along the movement to increase the efficiency of the artillery branch, which has not received so much attention as other arms in recent years and whose officers are complaining of the neglect. Mr. Manderson pointed out last spring the unpleasant fact that in the formation of its infantry the United States is behind every China, and he does not doubt that the arguments which led the Senate to adopt his bill last year will prevail this year.




