Emperor William of Germany died to-day and the sad news reached this city this afternoon. He was nearly 91 years of age. He was made King of Prussia in 1861 and Emperor of Germany in 1871. We will give some particulars to-morrow.

**Indications.**  
For North Carolina, rain, followed by colder, clearing weather and winds becoming brisk to high and northerly, with a cold wave.

**A Cold Wave Coming.**  
A big cold wave is said to be speeding its way in this direction. A dispatch from headquarters received at the Signal Office in this city at 11:30 to-day directs the cold wave signal to be hoisted and says that the temperature of this section will fall 20 degrees or more by 7 o'clock on Friday morning.

Previous to this, at 10 o'clock, instructions had been received here to hoist the cold wave signal. The signals were also ordered up at Charleston.

**The Opera House.**  
Flotow's three-act opera "L'Orubra," was presented for the first time in this city, at the Opera House last night by the Kate Bensberg English Opera Company. There was a full house to greet these new candidates for popular favor, and all present were highly gratified with the efforts made by this troupe of artists. The opera was an entire success, and all the vocalists are deserving of the highest praise. They all have well trained voices and were conscientious and pains-taking in the rendition of their several parts. We should be glad to see them in Wilmington again.

**Joint Meeting.**  
A joint meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and Produce Exchange was held at the rooms of the latter at noon to-day. Col. F. W. Kerchner, President of the Chamber of Commerce, called the meeting to order, and Mr. H. C. McQueen, President of the Produce Exchange, was called to the Chair and Col. J. L. Cantwell acted as Secretary. Mr. H. C. McQueen stated the object of the meeting to be to consider the proposed reduction in the force and expenses at the Custom House in this city and called upon Mr. C. H. Robinson, collector at this port, for some remarks bearing upon the subject. The latter gentleman, in response, went into an elaborate and exhaustive statement of the expenses and incomes of Charleston, S. C., Savannah, Ga., Mobile, Ala., and other Southern cities, as compared with those of this city. At the conclusion of Mr. Robinson's remarks, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted unanimously:  
WHEREAS, From published reports of Custom House transactions in this district which, while showing no diminution of business requiring official supervision and clerical assistance, exhibits a gradual reduction in operating expenses, from \$16,240, in 1884, to \$11,127, in 1887, and a cost to collect each dollar of revenue in 1885, 48 cents; in 1886, 47 cents; in 1887, 44 cents, and in the past six months only 17 cents, and  
WHEREAS, With the general growth and development of this city, our exports have increased from \$3,950,885 in 1884, to \$6,088,252, in 1887, while for the past six months they aggregate \$5,355,430, therefore be it  
Resolved, That, while endorsing at all times economical administration of public affairs, the importance of the custom service at this port, attached to which is the superintendency of lights for the entire coast of North Carolina, the revenue cutter service, and custodianship of all public buildings, call for an efficient service, and a respectful protest from this meeting against the contemplated reduction to be made at this port as necessarily injuring the efficiency of the present service.

**Resolved.** That Hon. Charles M. Steudman be commissioned to present the views of this joint meeting to the Honorable Secretary of the Treasury, and that copies hereof be sent to our Senators and Representatives in Congress. Adjourned.

**City Court.**  
There was a large docket for the Mayor's consideration this morning, which was disposed of in the following order:  
Mike Shelly, disorderly conduct. The judgment of the Court was a fine of \$10 or 20 days in the city prison.

Josephine McKay, colored, assault and battery, continued on account of absence of an important witness.

William H. Howe, colored, charged with selling liquor without a license, with selling liquor to minors, and with selling liquor on Sundays. On affidavit by defendant, through his counsel, Mr. J. D. Bellamy, Jr., that justice could not be obtained before Mayor Fowler, the case was removed to Justice John Cowan's Court for investigation.

David Hawkins, colored, assault and battery. Continued for the defendant.

Christian Hurt, colored, allowing hogs to run at large. Guilty on her own confession and a fine of \$5 was imposed.

Ella Martin, colored, drunk and disorderly. She is one of the hardest cases in the city and as there are charges of larceny against her, the investigation of her case was continued.

Emma Garrett, colored, disorderly conduct, which upon investigation proved to be of an aggravated character. The judgment of the Court was that she pay a fine of \$10 or work in the chain gang 30 days.

Nathan Yancey, a colored tramp. He thought that he could obtain work before night and was discharged with a warning either to get work or get out of the city at once.

John Wilder, a German tramp. He was furnished with an escort to the city limits.
