WHEREAS, With the general Meares' clothing house on North growth and development of this city, our exports have increased from \$3. 950,885 in 1884, to \$6,088,252, in 1887, while for the past six months they aggregate \$5,355,430, therefore be it Resolved, That in the proposed curtailment of the custom service this port is made to appear as a retrograding port, when the port exhibits her continuous and rapid growth; and if the contemplated reduction is effected, not only will an injustice be done the port in the public mind, but the service, which, in the opinion of this meeting is now reduced to its necessary requirements be greatly impaired, to the inconvenience of our merchants and shipping, and to the detriment of the public business requiring prompt and efficient despatch.

Resolved. That, while endorsing at all times economical administration of public affairs, the importance of the custom service at this port, attached to which is the superintendency of lights for the entire coast of North Carolina, the revenue cut ter service, and custodianship of ail public buildings, call for an efficient service, and a respectful protest from this meeting against the con-templated reduction to be made at this port as neccessarily injuring the efficiency of the present service.

Resolved, That Hon. Charles M. Stednan be commissioned to present the views of this joint meeting to the Honorable Secretary of the Treasury, and that copies hereof be sent to our Senators and Represenatives in Congress. Adjourned.
