Mutual organizations to insure against epidemics are being established in some of the large manufacturing of Sheffield, England. Each workman contributes 2 or 2½ per cent of his wages, and in return is guaranteed a payment equal to his average wages, should he be obliged to quit work on account of any epidemic in his family. The proprietors of the manufactories have charge of the funds.

It is altogether probable that the Chicago will exceed 17 knots over a measured mile when the bottom is scraped and the test made under the most favorable conditions.

The paper has been somewhat mutilated by mice, but it contains much of interest. We find in the news column, that Andrew Jackson, who was then President of the United States, had returned to Washington, on account of ill health, from his Northern tour. Spirits turpentine, at that time, sold for 37 cents per gallon. Tar was \$1.30 per barrel and the price of rosin was 90 cents for strained and \$1.00 for good strained. Hon. David L. Swain was then Governor of North Carolina, and his proclamation is published in the advertising columns, in regard to the Bank of North Carolina, and the subscription to its stock. The paper also contains one notice of petition of divorce from Brunswick county.
