IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Memorials were presented by Mr. Blair in favor of a national prohibitory constitutional amendment; one by Mr. Hoar against the admission of Utah as a State so long as its local power is in the hands of the Mormon priesthood; also, several in favor of the Blair Educational bill.

The bill introduced by Mr. Hoar to provide for a world's exposition at the National Capital in 1892, and thereafter for a permanent exposition of the three Americas in honor of the discovery of America, was referred to the select committee on the Centennial Celebration.

Mr. Mitchell then called up the joint resolution introduced by him Dec. 12, for the appointment of a commission to select a site for a naval station on the Pacific coast, and addressed the Senate in advocacy of it.

The Senate then took up the Blair Educational bill as unfinished business, the bill having been read in full.

The report (unanimous) of the Committee on Education and Labor, was then read, after which Mr. Blair said that as the bill had not passed the Senate, friends of the measure thought it proper to yield the floor to those opposed to it.

Mr. Rangan opposed the bill. He said he could hardly hope to throw any new light upon the subject; but he felt it due to the people of his State to give reasons why he should vote against the bill. So much of the purpose of the bill as looked to the enlargement of common school facilities had his hearty approval, and any measure for that purpose which did not involve violation of the constitution would command his support. It was not to the purposes of the bill, but to its methods, that he was opposed. His opposition to it, was based upon the absence of power in Congress to enact such a law. Its passage would be the adoption of a policy of centralization, which would establish the despotism of a popular majority, overthrow the constitution and endanger the liberties of the people. It offered a bribe of money to the people to sacrifice their manhood, their self reliance and their State government. It would be the surrender by the people of their birthright for a mess of pottage. He argued in detail that the Southern States were not in need of Federal aid for the support of their common schools; and showed that in the State of Texas the school fund for this year was \$3,100,000.

Mr. Best obtained the floor, but yielded to Mr. Plumb, who offered an amendment to the second section, providing that the money shall be distributed among the several States and Territories in proportion to their population, according to the census of 1880.

Mr. George stated that twenty-three Democratic Senators had voted for this bill on two occasions when it passed the Senate, and gave their names as Berry, Blackburn, Eustis, Brown, Call, Camden, Colquitt, Garland, George, Gibson, Hampton, Jackson, Jones of Florida, Jones of Arkansas, Kenna, Lamar, Payne, Pugh, Ransom, Vance, Voorhees and Waltham. The number of Democratic Senators voting against it was 13.

Mr. Blair read letters from educational authorities in Texas, complaining of the want of funds there and urging the passage of the bill.

The Senate then proceeded to the consideration of executive business, and when the doors were reopened adjourned till Monday.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
The following bills were introduced and referred:
By E. B. Taylor of Ohio, for the preservation of the woods and forests of the national domain adjacent to the sources of navigable rivers; also, to restore the rate of duty on imported wool.

By Mr. Stewart of Georgia, authorizing National Banks to take liens on real estate for loans of money.

By Mr. Collins of Massachusetts, to establish a Marine Signal Board of the United States, with a view to the adoption of a code and system of marine fog signals; also, for the prevention of cruelty to animals.

The Speaker announced the committees and when the House adjourned to Monday.

STATE NEWS.
Goldsboro Argus: The treasury of the city of Goldsboro is in a very healthy condition. The city has over \$5,000 to her credit. The Board of Aldermen on Tuesday night ordered a note of \$1,700 purchase money for the cemetery to be paid, which leaves the city out of debt and a nice sum to her credit.

Fayetteville Observer: We saw yesterday a fine large wild turkey killed by Sheriff McNeill, who is now in his 80th year, and we understand that it is no unusual thing with him. It seems that he is good in every thing—a good shot, a good Democrat, was a capital sheriff and is withal an excellent citizen and a mighty good man.

Charlotte Chronicle: Mr. C. O. Mercer of this city, yesterday received information of the destruction by fire of his gin house and saw mill, located at Bladenboro, in this State. The fire which destroyed his property occurred on the night of January 2nd. The gin house was a three-story structure. Mr. Mercer's loss is estimated at \$2,000 upon which there was no insurance. —Sixteen years ago Mr. Frank Greene, a citizen of Cleveland county, fearing prosecution upon account of the Ku Klux troubles, struck out for Texas, leaving his wife and three little boys behind him. His wife heard from him occasionally, up to ten years ago, when his letters ceased, and no news whatever could be obtained from him. Last Monday the missing husband arrived here, and went on to his old home in Cleveland, where he found his wife and three sons still living. The boys had grown up, and the father would never have been able to recognize them. In fact, when they first met, the old man did not know his wife and it was a long time before the wife made up her mind that the grizzled old man was really the Frank Greene who left her sixteen years ago. When all was explained, there was a happy reunion. Yesterday Mr. Greene passed through the city on the return to his home in Texas, accompanied by his wife and sons. The old man was as pretty full, but the boys took good care of him.

Raleigh News and Observer: Arrangements are in progress and nearly completed for the organization of a bicycle club in this city for the coming summer. Eight splendid bicycles are now owned by some young gentlemen here, and most of them are excellent riders. —The fire which broke out at Beaufort at 1:30 o'clock a. m. yesterday was the most destructive for years. It began on Front street in the store of Tyre Moore, Jr., and swept westward to the market house, which was taken down to prevent the progress of the flames. All the store buildings on the south or water side of Front street except those of S. J. Moore & Bro., Ives' fish house and Davis & Bros., were swept away. The stores of J. D. Guthrie & Co., Tyre Moore, Jr., Taylor & Buckston, Clawson, Wm. Sabiston, Chadwick & Jones, S. W. Gabrell, Thos. Thomas, R. E. Roberson & Bro. and W. F. Dill, general merchandise and Delamar, druggists were burned to ashes. The stocks of merchandise in the stores were only partially saved. The total amount of property involved in total or partial loss will aggregate at least \$50,000, partially covered by insurance (not estimated.) The fire was under control by 6 a. m.
