Mlle Rhea.
Mlle Rhea, who at this time needs no introduction to Wilmington theatre-goers, will appear at the Opera House on Friday and Saturday evenings of this week and at a Saturday matinee. Mlle Rhea is pre-eminently the society actress of our stage, the language to which she was born and whose sprightliness shaped her speech is the language of society. It will be made extremely realistic by the aid of salesladies, customers, a man milliner and a bewildering display of Parisian dresses. At the Saturday matinee Mlle Rhea appears as "Galatea" in W. S. Gilbert's beautiful mythological play of "Pygmalion and Galatea," a character that permits her to display her refined methods and graceful manners in a remarkable degree.

"Frou Frou" will be the attraction on Saturday evening. Judging from competent press criticisms, Mlle Rhea has struck the true chord of the complex character of "The Parisian Butterfly." She presents an ideal "Frou Frou," not painting it with undue coarseness but presenting every phase of the character in a natural and realistic manner. Delicacies in New York.
If we were in New York now and had to depend for existence upon the "delicacies" in that market, as quoted by the *Mail and Express*, we fear that we would starve in short order. Here are some figures:—Choice pomegranates are worth \$1 a dozen; selected bananas 50 cents a dozen; best pineapples, 50 cents each; best coconuts, 15 cents each; lady apples, 25 cents to 35 cents a quart; Cape Cod cranberries, 20 cents a quart; hothouse mushrooms, \$2 a pound; Florida persimmons, \$1 a dozen; selected table apples, 80 cents a half-peck; Florida strawberries, \$2 a cup; California pears, 60 cents to \$1.50 a dozen; Messina oranges, 40 cents a dozen; choice Florida oranges, 75 cents a dozen; Malaga grapes, 20 cents to 40 cents a pound; Catawba grapes, 40 cents for a 2 1/2 pound box; and hothouse grapes "may be had in limited quantities" at \$6 a pound.

Wood for the Poor.
It has been stated to us on undoubted authority that there is much of actual suffering among the poor of the city. There seems to be a great lack of fuel among these unfortunate people and they have no money with which to buy that necessary article. There are families in the city who lived through last Sunday without a stick of wood and with but a very little to eat. The condition of some of these families is made worse by sickness, and all of them call loudly for assistance. They are all worthy objects of charity and we trust that those who have been more blessed with this world's goods will contribute liberally of their store to the relief of the distressed. Funds for the relief of these distressed people, whose necessities are actual and urgent, may be left with Dr. F. W. Potter, city physician, with the assurance that they will be applied where the most good may be obtained.

Death of an Old Citizen.
Mr. E. Schulken, Sr., an old German citizen, died at his residence, corner of Front and Mulberry streets, last Saturday afternoon, aged 64 years, 6 months and 21 days. Mr. Schulken was a native of Blumenthal, Kingdom of Hanover, Germany, and came to Wilmington in 1848, where he had resided ever since, a period of 40 years. He was a quiet, peaceable and peace-loving citizen who was respected and esteemed by all who knew him. During the first year of the war the deceased was a Lieutenant in Company A, German Volunteers, of the 18th North Carolina regiment. Three brothers—one living in Germany, one in Whiteville, N. C. and Mr. Henry Schulken of this city survive him. The deceased was married in 1856, and his wife and one son, Mr. E. Schulken, Jr., also survive him. The deceased has been a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church for about 30 years and by his pure life, faithfulness and kindness endeared himself to all of its members. His obsequies were held yesterday at St. Paul's Lutheran Church and were attended by nearly or quite 1,000 persons. Rev. F. W. E. Peschau officiated and the pall bearers were Col. Roger Moore and Messrs. H. Vollers, L. Vollers, C. Schwarz, W. H. Alderman, John Haar, Jr., J. F. Rulfs, Sr., and H. Haar.
