## STATE NEWS.

**Asheville Citizen:** Rev. Mr. Pearson, the distinguished evangelist, has been induced to make his home in our midst. Mr. A. It was a graceful act on the part of Mr. G. and all are pleased to have Mr. P. with and of us.

**Greensboro Workman:** Dr. Benbow returned last night from Lansing, Michigan, to which place he was called by a telegram about a week ago announcing the fatal illness of his son-in-law, Mr. Reuben Crawford. Mr. Crawford died before Dr. Benbow reached Lansing, and was buried on last Saturday in that city. Mrs. Crawford returned with Dr. Benbow.

**Fayetteville News:** A colored man named Douglas Sellers shot his wife in the neck on Sunday morning. The wound is very dangerous, but not necessarily fatal. Jealousy was the cause. He is in jail. — Miss Carrie Cohen, daughter of Mr. N. H. Cohen, of our town, was married to Mr. Isaac Michaels, New York, at the residence of her parents. The bride is a native of this town and has a host of friends who will speed her on life's voyage with breezes of fondest wishes and zephyrs of love's rarest incense.

**Greensboro Patriot:** There is an old lady living in the Northern part of Stokes county, aged about 70 years, who never saw a railroad, or a cook stove, a sewing machine, or an organ. She has been on the public road but once in 10 years; she lives within a quarter of a mile of her brother-in-law and has visited him but once in four years, has not visited her brothers and sisters, who live but a short distance away, in 20 years. She does not employ a cook or washerwoman, spins and weaves, and makes her own clothing, besides doing the work for a family of four, and there is no place like home.

**Shelby News Era:** Rutherfordford has taken another step in the right direction and has organized a building and loan association. The capital stock is \$50,000 and is divided into 300 shares of \$100 each.

Last Sunday night, near Green's store in No. 11 township, Moulton Ramsay was badly cut in the left side and on the head by Peter Buff, known as "Big One-eyed Peter."
