IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Senate not in session.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. White, of New York, introduced a bill for the protection and administration of forests lands. Referred. (It withdraws from survey, sale, entry and disposal all unsurveyed public lands embracing natural forests and all public lands returned by public surveys as timber lands, and provides for the appointment of a Commissioner of Forests and four assistant commissioners, who shall have control of all forest lands owned by the United States. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Forests to classify the forests and timber lands, to determine what portion of these lands shall be permanently retained in reservation for climatic and other purposes, and what portion may be disposed of. Lands which are more valuable for agricultural than for timber purposes shall be restored to homestead entry and sale. The cutting, removal or destruction of any timber on forests lands owned by the United States is made a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment; but rights are reserved to agriculturists and miners to take wood for domestic purposes.)

On motion of Mr. Burnes, of Missouri, the Senate amendments to the Little Deficiency bill were concurred in.

In Committee of the Whole, the question was raised upon the bill for the relief of Martha Rumbough, that it was not properly upon the calendar. This is one of the class of bills reported by the Court of Claims to the 45th Congress, and brought forward under provisions of the Bowman act. A long discussion ensued and the matter was finally referred to the House for determination.

The bill was referred to the Committee on War Claims, and the House then at 4 o'clock adjourned until Monday.
