A conference of the Pastors engaged in the work of evangelizing the city, by districts, was held this morning and adjourned to meet again on Monday next, when it is hoped that the work will be completed.  
We are told that some of the drinking fountains which were bought for the city have not yet been placed in position, but they cumber the sides of the streets near where it is supposed that they will be placed.

**City Court.**  
The attention of the Mayor was called this morning to the charge of larceny preferred against Paul Ludley, Abram Watson and Tucker Merritt. The testimony was conclusive against them and they were bound over to the next term of the Criminal Court, in the sum of \$50. Abram Watson was discharged.

**The Seacoast Railway.**  
The Committee on Streets of the Board of Aldermen to whom was referred the application of the Wilmington Seacoast Railroad Company for the right of way through certain streets, with power to act thereon, met Saturday afternoon in the Mayor's room at the City Hall, and after due consideration of the matter granted the application of the company, with the single modification of substituting Queen for Castle street, so that the road will belt the city, from the Atlantic Coast Line depot on Front street to Brunswick, upon this street from Eighth to McRae; on Fanning from McRae to Dickinson; Dickinson from Fanning to Mulberry; Tenth from Mulberry to Castle; Church from Tenth to Seventeenth; Queen from Eleventh to Cape Fear river. Work is to be commenced at once and will be prosecuted vigorously. By the first of July we confidently expect to go by rail from the city to the Atlantic Ocean.

**The Railroad Election.**  
His Honor, Mayor Fowler, has issued a call for elections to be held on Thursday, March 1st, on the question of a subscription by the city to the capital stock of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R. and the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina R. R. The matter is therefore fairly and squarely before the people and it rests with them to say whether they will have the roads. As for the REVIEW, we are plainly and unequivocally in favor of both schemes, simply because we believe that they will both promote, in a wonderful degree, the prosperity of our city. Our advocacy is based upon substantial grounds and is from a purely business point of view. It is simply as an investment that we regard it—an investment that may or that may not prove profitable, but with the chances decidedly in favor of the affirmative. Our reasoning is very simple. The present valuation of real estate in the city is about \$4,500,000. Anything that will raise this valuation is a benefit; anything that will raise it largely is a great benefit. If the subscription to the two roads is made and the valuation of real estate increased then the city will have that much more value in realty from which to derive revenue by taxation. If the increase is but 5 per cent on present valuation then this increase alone will amount to very near the sum subscribed to the two roads; if it is 10 per cent, it will double it; if it is 20 per cent, it will quadruple it. At 5 per cent the interest on \$250,000 is \$12,500 and if the increase in real estate value is but 10 per cent then the taxes on this increased valuation alone will more than pay the interest on the bonds. Yet there is another way and a better way in which the investment can be made to pay and that lies in the fact that nearly all of the entire amount—if not all of it—will be expended, in the legitimate course of trade, in this city. Indeed, we may say that every dollar of it will find its way into circulation here. Take, for instance, the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R. By the terms of the agreement the construction of this road is to be begun at this end of the line and prosecuted hence towards Fayetteville. It will cost, roughly estimated, \$800,000 to build this road between the two cities and, as roughly estimated, the iron and mechanical materials and tools will cost \$200,000. This amount will not be expended here but the balance, \$600,000, surely will be—and if it is not it will be the fault of our own people. Of this \$600,000 the fair and legitimate profit ought to be 25 per cent, or \$150,000, which is the amount of subscription. And so with the Onslow R. R. The amount to be expended in the construction of that road, outside of the cost of the iron &c., will likewise find its trade outlet here and the result will be more money, more trade and increased valuations.
