The Legislature of Louisiana will elect two United States Senators next May. One of these is to succeed Mr. Randall Gibson, whose term will expire March 4, 1889, the other to succeed Mr. James B. Eustis, whose term will expire March 4, 1891. The long interval between the sessions of the Louisiana Legislature makes it necessary to elect both Senators at once. There is no doubt that Senator Gibson will succeed himself. He supported the Nicholls wing of the Democracy in the recent State campaign. Senator Eustis was on the other side, and a determined effort will be made to defeat him. Ex-Senator Jones, Judge E. D. White and Congressman Blanchard are candidates for his seat.
