Ex-Senator Hill, of Colorado, is a strong Republican but also an admirer of President Cleveland. He is now in Washington and said the other day: "We have a good President." On a previous visit to the Capital he expressed himself as much surprised when he talked with the President about the dishonest agents for the public lands in the West and other evils existing there.

The Chinese minister was asked the other day if his country had any ill-feeling towards the United States for its effort to check Chinese immigration. He said: "None at all. We are trying to restrict it ourselves. Those who come here from China belong to the working class. We are much more concerned with the protection of our commercial relations with the United States and our merchants doing business in America. That is China's chief concern. We wish to extend our commercial relations with this country as much as possible, and to do so our merchants in America must be protected. Concerning this, however, we have no fear, as we rely upon the fairness and justice of the American Government."

Henry George now comes out flat-footed for Cleveland. In the last issue of his paper he says: "I am now in favor of the nomination and election of Grover Cleveland because his nomination and election on the tariff issue would, it seems to me, best clear the way for bringing into practical politics something far more important than tariff reform. It makes no difference to me what Mr. Cleveland may think of my ultimate aims. To force the issue which he stands for in practical politics will clear the way to bring into practical politics what I aim at. If I have miles to walk I do not refuse the chance to get a lift on a wagon that will go but a mile and then turn back, especially if that mile be a steep grade, after which my road lies downhill. I take advantage of the wagon and thank the driver, and when he comes to where he proposes to turn back I get off and continue on."

Dr. McGlynn is again firing messages to Rome, but to whom or for what purpose no one has yet been able to find out. Saturday night last, at a late hour, a gentleman saw Dr. McGlynn enter the Western Union office in New York, sit down, and write a cable dispatch of about thirty words in Latin, and then hurriedly thrust it through the window to the receiver of cablegrams. He also handed the receiver a fifty-dollar bill, and asked him for change. The employee said that he could not change the bill at such a late hour, whereupon Dr. McGlynn said: "Well, that is the only bill that I have, and that message must go tonight. You can keep the bill, and I will call for the change." Then he hurried out of the building. It was said on Friday that Dr. McGlynn has for some time past been communicating with his friends in Rome and trying to get a reversal of the excommunication against him.

When August Spies was arrested the Chicago Arbeiter Zeitung was deprived of its editor. After his execution the stockholders of the paper began to look out for a new editor, and offered that position to several leaders of Anarchy in this country, but none could be induced to accept the position. At last an imported editor has been secured. The name of the new editor is known to very few persons. The nom de plume by which he is known to his associates is Henry London. In appearance he is short, stout and eminently vigorous. His face is pale and intellectual, and he is not more than thirty years of age. He seems a mere commonplace person until he speaks, and then the enthusiasm which possesses him compels the dullest listener to admit that he is no ordinary man. On the subject of anarchy he can harangue for hours in English, French, German, Italian or Spanish and is as apt with his pen as he is with his tongue. Since his arrival in New York he has been a regular contributor to John Most's Freilief, and he has also sent weekly reports regarding the spread of anarchy in America to

the principal Socialist journals of Europe. But possibly his greatest merit in the eyes of his associates is the fact that he has made a thorough study of anarchy, as it has developed itself in England, France, Germany and other countries, and is the trusted confidant of William Morris, Prince Krapotkin, Annie Besant, John Most and all other prominent exponents of advanced economic ideas.
