IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

### SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Among the bills introduced and referred to Committees was one by Sherman, authorizing the issue of circulating notes to National Banks to the par value of bonds deposited therefor. On motion of Mr. Eustis the Senate bill for the purchase of a site and the erection of a building for a postoffice, United States Courts and other government uses, in New Orleans, (not to exceed in cost \$1,200,000) was taken from the calendar and passed.

The Senate then resumed consideration of the bill granting pensions to ex-soldiers and sailors who are incapacitated from the performance of manual labor, and providing for pensions to dependent relatives of deceased soldiers and sailors. The question being on the adoption of Mr. Call's amendment, making the bill apply also to those who served in the war with Mexico or for thirty days in any of the Indian wars, the amendment was agreed to. After a long debate, of a decided political cast, the bill went over and the Senate adjourned.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

In the morning hour the House resumed in Committee of the Whole consideration of the bill for the organization of the Territory of Oklahoma. Mr. Barnes, of Georgia, gave notice that he would at the proper time offer a substitute for the appointment of a commission to negotiate with Indian Territory with a view to opening up that portion of the Territory lying west of the 98th meridian of longitude to white settlers.

The morning hour expired and the Committee rose without action. The House then went into Committee of the Whole, on public buildings measures. The \$400,000 appropriation for Omaha (reduced from \$500,000) was passed.

Mr. Bland opposed the next bill, (a \$50,000 appropriation for Bar Harbor, Maine), which brought Mr. Miller to his feet in defence of the bill. The appropriation was reduced to \$25,000 and the bill was agreed to.

The next bill called up was that for the erection of an appraisers' building in the city of New York. The bill contains alternative propositions for the purchase of a site and erection of appraisers' stores at a cost limited to a million and a half dollars, and for the purchase of a single site suitable for erecting a combined custom house and appraisers' stores; or, two sites convenient to each other and suitable for custom house and appraisers' stores detached from each other. The cost of such a site or sites is limited to a million and a half dollars. The bill was agreed to unanimously.

Bills were also agreed to increasing to \$300,000 the limit of the cost of the building at Charleston, S. C.; appropriating \$100,000 for an interior State building at Texarkana, and \$100,000 for a building at Columbus, Ga., and appropriating \$125,000 for the purchase of additional ground at Indianapolis, Ind.

Bills were also agreed to for the erection of a public building at Bay City, Mich., at an ultimate cost of \$150,000 and appropriating \$400,000 for a building at Milwaukee, Wis. The committee having risen, the House ratified its action and also passed two bills coming over from Saturday, increasing the limit of the appropriation for a building at Chattanooga and providing for the purchase of a site at Buffalo.

### STATE NEWS.

Newbern Journal: Barbara Stafford, living on Isaac Forbes' plantation, was the happy mother of three fine children yesterday morning. Dr. N. H. Street was in attendance, and we learn from the doctor that the mother and the children, two boys and one girl, are getting on finely. The mother of Barbara had eight children at three births, triplets twice and twins.

Lumberton Robesonian: It is our sad and painful duty to announce the sudden death of Rev. D. May, aged sixty-six years. It occurred at his residence Tuesday morning between 4 and 5 o'clock. Never in all our life have we known as much rain to fall in the same length of time as visited this section last week, beginning on

night. It was an almost incessant down-pour most of the time.

Fayetteville Journal: Mr. H. C. Smith, assistant postmaster of this city, left this morning to enter the postal service on the Atlantic Coast Line between Washington and Wilmington. — Capt. J. C. Huske, Jr., and Mr. Louis Hale left this morning for New York, where they will take the steamer for England. Mr. Hale is in delicate health, and goes home to his parents in Manchester, England, under the efficient care of Capt. Huske. — Mr. W. M. Decker, Railway Postal Clerk on the Atlantic Coast Line between Washington City and Wilmington N. C., has resigned his position on the mail service, and will in a few days embark the Job Printing business in this city.

Raleigh News and Observer: Up to date there have been 440 Farmers' Alliances organized in the State. — There are at present in the city 172 houses connected with the water works system. — Petitions are being circulated in the city requesting a vote on the question of local option in June next. Over 1,100 signatures have already been obtained, about 1,400 being necessary to the calling of an election. — In consequence of illness of Judge Shipp Wake Superior Court did not convene yesterday. The Clerk of the Court received a letter from Judge Shipp yesterday morning, informing him that he was detained at his home in Charlotte with an attack of erysipelas and would not be able to open Court.

Charlotte Chronicle: A telegram from Shelby yesterday informs us that a beautiful young girl, sixteen years of age, was arrested at that place yesterday, upon the charge of having eloped with a negro man named Tom Flack, of Montgomery county, Alabama. The girl's name is Lizzie McCoy, and she says that she is from Atlanta. The negro in question escaped, and it is supposed is making his way to Charlotte. Officers are after him. — Mr. Jack Rheinhardt, of Lincoln county, has struck a veritable bonanza. At least, he has found a gold mine, in a cotton field on his farm, for which he has been offered \$20,000 in cash, which offer he refused to accept. The ore uncovered is of the richest quality, and the vein is a large and well defined one. Parties who have seen it and who are competent to judge, say that it is one of the richest mines ever developed in this section. — Andrew Connelly, the man who was shot by J. C. Alderholt at Hudson last Saturday, was about 20 years old. He was drunk and in a house with a questionable character, and acted so badly that all parties were afraid to go near Mr. Alderholt at the earnest solicitation of others was induced to go into the house when Connelly, uttering an oath, and with a large dirk knife, made for him, but before he reached his man, a 32-calibre bullet stopped him. Mr. Alderholt gave himself up, and claims the shooting was in self-defense. Alderholt owns a saw and shingle mill at Hudson and is a peaceable citizen. Connelly is the last of four brothers who have died with their boots on. About three years ago they tried to come to Hickory and paint the town, and once, while on their way home from this city, two of the brothers killed the third and they immediately skipped for Texas. They were not long in that State before they got to fooling with horses with halters attached. The usual result was a rope halter adjusted so closely to their necks that their career was ended.
