IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 1. The pension bill was taken up, the pending question being on the amendment offered yesterday by Mr. Wilson, of Iowa, to add the words, "from infirmities of age." Mr. Beck said that he understood the meaning of the amendment to be that every man who served in the late war or in the war with Mexico, or in any Indian war, and who was suffering under the "infirmities of age," would be entitled to a pension of \$12 a month. He supposed that every man over 50 or 60 years of age would consider himself as suffering under the infirmities of age. Could the Senator from Iowa or any other Senator guess how much money that amendment, if adopted, would take out of the treasury? He ventured to assert that five hundred millions would not half cover the amount of expenditure under it. There was no use, he said, in talking of a surplus in the Treasury. This bill would settle that for all time to come. The moment Congress undertook to pension all the men who became old the country would be bankrupted unless taxes were doubled, tripled and quadrupled. Protected robbers, the baron monopolists, could not have drawn a bill in their own interest more adroitly than this bill was drawn. Incidental to this phase of the bill Mr. Beck digressed to a discussion of the tariff, and later on to the demonetization of silver and trusts.

Without a vote on the pending amendment the Senate adjourned till Monday.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Blount, from the committee on Post Offices and Post Roads, reported adversely the bill prohibiting transmission through the mails of newspapers containing lottery advertisements. House calendar.

Mr. Dibble, from the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, reported a bill to enlarge the public building at Atlanta. Committee of the Whole.

Public buildings were then provided for at Bridgeport, Conn., and Hoboken, N. J., and the House adjourned.

STATE NEWS.

Shelby *Aurora*: Mr. Jos. T. Cabanis, son of A. Mont. Cabanis, while driving a wagon loaded with 600 feet lumber, met with a sad accident on Tuesday morning. The team ran away and he was precipitated on the wagon tongue between the team and the loaded wagon ran over his stomach. He has since died.

Newbern *Journal*: Information was received in this city yesterday that the schooner *Mattie E. Hiles*, Capt. Smith, from Baltimore bound to Washington with a cargo of lime, struck on Gull Rock, Pamlico sound, Monday morning and filled with water. The crew had to remain on the cabin through the night, which was quite cold. The cargo is a total loss.

Asheville *Citizen*: Mr. Steven Jones, an old resident of this county, died suddenly Monday night at the residence of Mr. Taylor Burnett in this city. He had not been well for some time. Monday night, as he sat down to supper he complained of feeling very badly and was persuaded to go and lie down. He did so, and in a few moments expired. It is thought heart disease was his ailment.

Hickory *Carolinian*: About ten o'clock Tuesday night the fire alarm called attention to the burning of Wallace Bridgers' residence in the extreme Southern part of town. The fire started in the "L" and when discovered was too far advanced to be checked by the means at hand. Most of the furniture was saved. The house was a two story, four room building with an "L" and three brick chimneys.

Kinston *Free Press*: The correspondent of the Newbern Journal from this place, Rev. H. C. Brown, wrote and had published an item relating to Cook & Co., a new firm of this place, warning the people from buying goods of them unless they wanted to appear in court as witnesses. Mess. Cook & Co., have brought action against Mr. Brown for libel and the trial was set for Wednesday March 6th.

Fayetteville *Journal*: Jas. Jones, a citizen of Campbellton, fell dead yesterday while walking on the rail-

road track, near the oil mills. He had just started out hunting and was stricken within a few yards of his home. — Priscilla Sykes, a woman well-known in our city, who was very poor and lived on charity, met with a horrible death yesterday in Campbellton. From what we can gather she had a fit of some kind and fell into the fire, burning herself so severely as to result in death in a few hours afterward.

(Clinton *Caucasian*): The Rev. F. R. Underwood has accepted the pastoral care of Piney Grove church Sampson county. He will preach regularly on the fourth Sunday and Saturday before of every month. — Moses Sellars a colored man aged about 75 years, and somewhat demented from sickness, wandered away from the home of his son in Little Cobarie township near Huntly about three weeks ago and, notwithstanding most careful search, cannot be found. It is supposed that he wandered into some swamp and has perished.
