

In 1868, when the heavy wool tax went into effect, only \$4,000,000 worth of raw wools were imported. In 1878 the importation amounted to \$8,363,000. In 1887 it was \$16,351, 900. Thus while, in theory, the production of American wool was being fostered by a tax, American manufacturers have been obliged to double their foreign orders for wool between 1868 and 1878, and to double the purchase of 1878 in 1887. The treasury figures show also that the price of wool has been altogether independent of the tax on it. In 1864 the price of fine and medium was 87 cents; in 1869, under the high tax, it was only 48 cents.

The Virginia State Central Committee will meet in Richmond to day to consider the time, place and method of selecting delegates to the National Convention of the party at St. Louis, Mo., June 5, 1888, and such other business as may be brought before it. It is thought that the committee will fix upon an early day in May as the time for holding the State Convention .-Much interest is manifested in the selection of the place, and Richmond and Lynchburg are menticaed. The names of many well-known Democrats have already been suggested as delegates to the St. Louis Convention from the State at large. These places are much sought after.

The hotel and railroad people of Florida do not fear California as a formidable rival. They say that the rush of tourists there this sea-York, Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis and Louisville bring in crowds every day. Eight hundred and fifty people registered at Thomasville one day last week. Besides the splendid railroad and steamship facilities for reaching Florida quickly, it has become a land of hotels, ranging from the most luxurious to those less pretious, where persons of moderate means can find accommodations sulted to their requirements. These attractions not only draw the wealthy, who can afford the luxuries of a hotel system unequalled on the globe, but poorer people as well.

Another and more urgent cry for help comes up from the faminestricken people of Asiatic Turkey. Thousands of starving creatures have sold their last shred of clothng for food, and are left even without the means of hiding their emaciated forms. The American mis sionary board announces that \$4,000 a month is imperatively needed for the next three months to meet the most piercing demands of Central Turkey alone, and that in Eastern Turkey the famine shows no signs of abatement. Immense relief can be afforded by prompt contributions: \$75 or \$80 will allay the suffering of a whole village. At Adana four hundred men, who have been given work at fifteen cents a day apiece, continue to support themselves and four others dependent apon them for the barest necessities of life. A suit of clothes can be furnished for \$1.50.

The confirmation of the report of the second disaster on the Yellow River, which drowned four thousand laborers, who were forming dykes or break waters out of stone. laden bamboo rafts, adds another chapter to the ruin wrought by the stream so expressively called 'Ohina's Sorrow." But it is more than likely that the news of other calamities will follow, since the great season of danger will be in a month or two, when the spring freshets come.
