The almost unbroken series of lisasters which have attended Peru ver since her ill-starred war with Chile has not yet come to an end. To her financial distress is added a new source of anxiety from the greedy attitude imputed by some of her people to Ecuador on the North and Bolivia on the South, whom they fancy to be acting as if Peru nent. Bolivia's coveting of Arequipa and Mollendo, at the extreme South of Peru, is even suspected of receiving encouragement from Chile. Should Bolivia attempt to seize this region it would seem like an additional retribution for Peru's

fatal policy of ten years ago. 
