Central Europe has still some immense tracts of uncleared forest lands. In some Austrian provinces, such as Croatia and Slavonia, the proportion of woodland to the population is so great that if it were divided among the inhabitants nearly two acres would fall to the lot of each person. In the three principal wood producing districts there are nearly 4,000,000 acres of forests, the yearly increase of which is valued at more than \$2,500,000. The export of wood is a large item in Austrian trade.

We have received the report of Gen. W. P. Roberts, State Auditor. From it we learn that the assessed value of real and personal property in the State in 1887 aggregated \$210,035,453, against \$202,893,502 for the year 1886, an increase of \$7,141,953.

There are now borne on the pension rolls of the State 3,524 pensioners, of which number 3,476 are widows and 1,048 soldiers and besides there are many hundred claims held on account of the absence of certain proofs required by the Board.

A specially interesting statement is that which shows not only the amount of the property and franchise tax paid by the different railroads of the State (property paying \$14,439.32 and franchise \$1,801.23), but further, so far as reported, the number of miles of railroad, value per mile, value of track, value of rolling stock and all other property, including capital stock, &c., &c. It is a valuable addendum to the report usually made.

It is a significant fact that the Pennsylvania Railroad, during the fiscal year of the operation of the Inter-State law, experienced a period of almost unprecedented prosperity, its gross earnings for the year increasing \$13,800,000, and net earnings \$3,680,000, the surplus remaining from the lines east of Pittsburg after the payment of all interest, insurance and sinking fund charges, and a 5 per cent. dividend, amounting to \$1,983,599. This is the record of a great trunk line under the operations of the law forbidding pooling and short haul discriminations. But the year was one of unusual business activity, especially in the iron line. The average freight earnings a ton a mile have been reduced to only a little more than two thirds of a cent. And yet one-third of the earnings are derived from that source.

Raleigh News and Observer: As the Cincinnati Enquirer observes, Ingalls "richly deserved the scolding that he received from Senator Blackburn, of Kentucky; and all the evidences go to show that it was about as severe a scolding as any man ever received under the restraining influences of parliamentary law." Referring to the castigation, the Washington correspondent of the Chicago Herald says amid the uproar of applause that greeted the admirable punishment applied by the Kentucky Senator the voice of Vance was heard in gleeful encouragement crying out, "Hit him again!" Moreover the Herald correspondent noted the fact that as Blackburn mercilessly laid bare the outrageous nature of Ingalls' attack on the President, the Radical hater and sun of all that is rancorous wined under the merited infliction and looked as if he wished thoroughly that "He hadn't said any thing at all about Mr. Cleveland." The truth is that the leader of the Northern irreconcilables was very thoroughly and deservedly rebuked for his unpatriotic and disgraceful utterances as well as answered and all people with any regard for the proprieties, to say the least, will rejoice in the fact.
