Central Europe has still some immeuse tracts of uncleared forest lands. In some Austrian provinces, such as Croatia and Slavonia, the proportion of woodland to the popvided among the inhabitants nearly wood producing districts there are nearly 4,000,000 acres of forests, the yearly increase of which is valued at more than \$2,500,000. The export of wood is a large item in Austrian trade.

We have received the report of ien, W. P. Roberts, State Auditor. From it we learn that the assessed value of real and personal property in the State in 1887 aggregated \$210,035,453, against \$202,893,502 for the year 1886, an increase of \$7,141,

There are now borne on the pension rolls of the State 3,524 pensioners, of which number 2,476 are widows and 1,048 soldiers "and besides there are many hundred claims held on account of the absence of cer tain proofs required by the Board.

A specially interesting statement is that which shows not only the amount of the property and franchise tax paid by the different rail roads of the State (property paying \$14,499.82 and franchise \$1,891.23) but further, so far as reported, the number of miles of railroad, value per mile, value of track, value of rolling stock and all other property, including capital stock, &c., &c. It is a valuable addendum to the report usually made.

It is a significant fact that the Pennsylvania Railroad, during the fiscal year of the operation of the Inter-State law, experienced a per riod of almost unprecedented prosperity, its gross earnings for the year increasing \$13,800,000, and net earnings \$3,680,000, the surplus re. maining from the lines east of Pitts. burg after the payment of all interest, insurance and sinking fund charges, and a 51 per cent. dividend, amounting to \$1,983,599. This is the record of a great trunk line under the operations of the law forbidding pooling and short haul discriminations. But the year was one of unusual business activity, especially in the iron line. The average freight earnings a ton a mile have been reduced to only a little more than two thirds of a cent. And yet onethird of the earnings are derived from that source.

Raleigh News and Observer: As the Cincinnati Enquirer observes.
