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

The San Francisco hotels are now crowded with tourists, most of whom are returning after spending the winter in Southern California. This winter has not been pleasant anywhere in California, as the cold has in style. been almost unprecedented, and heavy rains have fallen during most of January. It is a curious fact that the temperature has averaged higher in central than in southern California this winter. Los Angeles land agents exhibited photographs of gardens in Oakland and Sacramento with fountains frozen in the midst of bananas and fan palms and icicles hanging on orange trees, but the truth was that equally severe freezing took place at Riverside and Los Angeles, though, of course, it did no serious damage to oranges and lemons. It cut down tropical vegetation, however, and showed that neither of the two regions can

claim immunity from frost.

A circular dated Paris, February 17th, has just been sent to leading philologists and others interested in the questions of an international language, which says: "The Universal Exposition of 1889 offers us a most valuable opportunity for the adoption by an international congress of a universal language, enabling all peoples to correspond with one another. It is then proposed to obtain, on another part of the same sheet, signatures to a formal call, in which the director of the Exposition of 1889 is requested to convoke such a congress and the signers agree to do their best either to be present at the Congress or to see that their country is represented thereat. Mr. Charles E. Sprague, of 1,271 Broadway, New York, has been requested to receive and forward signatures to the petition from those who favor the project.

The most important change of opinion regarding the Government of Ireland is that of Lord London derry. He, like Lord Carnarvon, accompanied his acceptance of the office of Viceroy of Ireland with a stipulation that in certain conditions he should be at liberty to retire and, like Lord Carnarvon, he has since become convinced that a policy of conciliation is the only method of successfully governing Ireland-Recently Lord Londonderry informed Lord Salisbury that he had had enough of Dublin Castle under a coercion policy, and requested that he be allowed to resign. Lord Salisbury, wishing to keep things as they are until after the Easter holidays at least, pressed Lord Londonderry to remain in Dublin, at the same time promising that Irish local government would shortly be brought into Parliamentary prominence. The education of the Conservative party on the subject of home rule in Ireland appears to be proceeding more rapidly than could be conveniently admitted by the party leaders.


