### Foreign Exports.

The foreign exports for the month of March as compiled from the books at the Custom House foot up as follows.

Cotton, 2,087 bales, valued at \$100,150; spirits turpentine 2,495 gallons, \$910; rosin, 23,603 barrels, \$25,759; tar, 2,262 barrels, \$2,949; pitch, 14 barrels, \$37; lumber, 1,570,000 feet, \$22,973; timber \$900; shingles, 1,240,000, value \$6,278; miscellaneous, \$1,176. Total 171,255.

### Two Fire Alarms.

One of the alarms this morning was sent in from Box 35. It was caused by the burning of a pile of trash on Thirteenth street, between Market and Princess. The fire department was promptly on hand, and the boys were amply disgusted when they found what it was that had called them out of their warm beds.

At 3:30 o'clock though there was another alarm and this time the business was of a more serious nature. The alarm was from Box 43, corner Sixth and Red Cross streets, and the fire was caused by the burning of Mr. J. W. Wood's house, corner Ninth and Harnett, which was entirely consumed. Insured with Messrs. Smith & Boatwright in the Virginia Fire and Marine Insurance Co. for \$200.

### County Commissioners.

The Board met in monthly session yesterday.

E. Hewlett, county treasurer, submitted his report, showing a balance on hand to the credit of the Educational Fund of \$16,157.25, and balance to the credit of the General Fund \$18,155.87; total, \$34,313.12.

Report of the Register of Deeds showed receipts of \$7.55 received from marriage licenses during the month.

L. D. Cherry was appointed special surveyor to survey lands of V. F. Williams on Greenville Sound.

The chairman of the Board of Managers of the City Hospital submitted his annual report which was ordered spread upon the minutes of the Board. The report shows total expenditures for the year ended Dec. 31, 1887, \$3,029.87, received from pay patients and other source \$333.63. Applications are becoming very frequent from pay patients from abroad, and the reports says, if the hospital is to grow in usefulness and become wholly or in part self-sustaining, this class of patients should be encouraged—it is absolutely necessary that a ward should be constructed and furnished for this class without delay. The cost of the ward, furnished, is estimated at \$2,500.—The number of patients treated during the year is 188, of which 41 were pay patients; 169 were successfully treated and 19 died.

### Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met in regular session yesterday afternoon, and approved bills for current expenses amounting to \$4,979,43, and the contract for feeding prisoners, printing and advertising awarded by the Board of Aldermen at their last meeting.

The Board adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

### A Graceful Recognition.

We are glad to note the cordial support recorded last night at the hands of the Board of Aldermen of a proposition submitted to them looking to a substantial aid and encouragement of the Wilmington Light Infantry. Alderman Fish-plate submitted an application by Capt. Daniel and Lieuts. Harris and Morrison, asking that \$500 be appropriated annually to their aid and the Board, after a short discussion unanimously agreed to do so. It only remains now to get the endorsement of the Board of Audit and Finance and we hope that this will be readily attained.

The Wilmington Light Infantry is now, as it has been in times past, the pride and delight of our people. It has been faithful in every emergency and holds itself in readiness at any time when called upon. During the disastrous fire of February, 1886, when it did patrol duty, it probably saved to our people more than ten times the sum asked. The action of the Board of Aldermen last night is a graceful recognition of the merits of this splendid organization.

### The Hibernian Ball.

The Anniversary Ball of the Hibernian Benevolent Society took place last night at their hall on Third street. It was a pleasant and an inspiring success. The music was furnished by the harpers and the dancing was kept up until nearly daylight. At 12 o'clock supper was announced. The spread was made under the superintendence of Mr. T. E. Wallace and it was a delightful and appetizing repast. The substantial gave way to liquids and rich and sparkling wines flowed freely. A dozen or more of toasts were propounded and responded to. Maj. ### Harbor Master's Report.

We compile the following for the month of March from the books of Capt. Joseph Price, Harbor Master: The total arrivals at this port during the month were 6 steamers, 5,772 tons; 1 barque, 391 tons; 1 brig, 429 tons; 13 schooners, 3,681 tons; a total of 21 vessels and 10,273 tons. These were all American. The foreign arrivals consisted of 2 barques, 896 tons. Grand total, 23 vessels, and 11,169 tons.

### At the Tabernacle.

There was another large attendance at the Tabernacle last night, and there is no abatement as yet in the interest felt. Mr. Pearson's preaching is as vigorous as ever and although the strain on him for the past two weeks and more must be terrible—and especially so to a man of his apparent physical delicacy—yet he shows no signs of weariness. A large number repaired to the inquiry room at the close of the sermon and 51 conversions were reported.
